From the Badlands of South Dakota to the high peaks of the Rockies, there is wonder to be discovered everywhere we turn in the Old West!

Join us as we gallop through the wonder-filled West, where our friends at Wonder Junction will teach us about the grandest wonder of all—Jesus Christ. Each day, we'll dig deeper into who this awe-inspiring Jesus is, answering questions such as:

- What amazing things happened surrounding Jesus' birth?
- What was Jesus like as a child and teen?
- What wonders occurred during Jesus' ministry years?
- How were Jesus' death and resurrection like no other?
- What should we be doing as we wait for Jesus' return?

Wonder and amazement await us each day at Wonder Junction, where kids will gather at the **All Aboard Assembly**, a high-energy beginning that includes wacky intros, lively songs, a mission moment, and prayer.

Then we're off to rotate through five fun sites:

High Point Bible Time, where God's Word is taught in creative, hands-on ways.

Carpenter Joe's Science and Crafts, where kids get their hands dirty as they make crafts and explore God's world through science experiments.

Sweet Sadie's Snacks, where kids munch on some downright tasty home-cooked vittles.

Our Goal

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

The content of *Wonder Junction* may be new to you. For a list of helpful articles on the topics covered in this VBS program, please visit AnswersVBS.com/wonderfaq.

TERMS TO KNOW

Throughout the VBS curriculum, various terms will be used. Here is a list of some of the most common terms to know.

Partners (as in, "Howdy, partners!"): Groups of children (individual classes) named after Old West people, such as Miners, Ranchers, Blacksmiths, and Homesteaders.

Group Guides: Group leaders who guide the partners from place to place during VBS. No teaching is required of this position.

High Point Bible Time: Bible and apologetics lesson time happening at the High Point Chapel.

Truth Teachers: Teachers of the High Point Bible Time. **Carpenter Joe's Science and Crafts:** Rotation site where crafts are made and science experiments are explored.

Sweet Sadie's Snacks: Indoor or outdoor location where snacks are served.

Gallopin' Gabe's Games: Indoor or outdoor site (outdoor is preferred) for recreation time.

Miss Millie's Missions, Music, and Memory Verses:
Rotation site where kids can spend additional time
learning songs and memory verses and hearing about
missions.

Gold Mine Memory Time: Time to learn and practice the daily Bible verse.

Animal Pals: Our friendly animal mascots that remind us of the main themes of each day.

Toddlers: 2-4-year-olds.

Pre-Primaries: 4–6-year-olds or children ages 4 through those who have completed kindergarten.

Primaries: 6–9-year-olds or children who have completed grades 1–3.

Juniors: 9–12-year-olds or children who have completed grades 4–6.

For multi-age K–6 travel groups, we recommend using the material for the Primaries.

TOP 20 PRE-PRIMARY TEACHING TIPS

- Pray and study God's Word. That is your most important preparation. God has entrusted you with the awesome privilege of opening his Word and sharing it daily with the children, so be well prepared. Acts 6:4—"We will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word."
- 2. Read through all your lesson plans well in advance and become familiar with the resources at AnswersVBS. com/wonderresources. Begin to pray and plan now, then continue to pray during and after VBS.
- 3. In this guide:
 - » Teaching Tips are marked with a ★.
 - » Materials for each activity are listed next to the activity.
 - » The "teacher says" portion is bold.
- 4. You may want to assign the task of gathering supplies for all the teachers to one person or have the teachers divide up the supply list, with each being responsible for multiples of certain items. It's also helpful to get all the supplies ready in a box or bag ahead of time rather than gathering them day-by-day the week of VBS.
- 5. See Decorating Decisions for a picture and description of the teaching set. Also, when setting up the room, you may want to clear away tables and chairs, depending on the room size and number of children expected.
- 6. Modify the Exploration Stations as your situation warrants. Use as suggested or incorporate one or more ideas into the lesson time instead, doing it with the whole group at one time.
- Ask group guides to help man the Exploration Stations each day. Post the directions and Teaching Tie-Ins at each station every day as an easy reference for your helpers.
- 8. A puppet is used daily at some point during the lesson. It may also be used to welcome the children, sing a song, or review a memory verse. The puppet can come up from a puppet stage if there are two of you to do the puppet skit. If working alone, the puppet can come up from behind a suitcase with the lid flipped up.
- 9. Attend the Teacher Workshop and the Gospel Workshop. Be prepared to share the good news of salvation!

- 10. Dress in Old West period clothes such as a vest and cowboy hat or a prairie costume. You can also wear the T-shirt, hat, and vest available from the Resource Catalog. Take on a persona to bring lessons to life. Some teachers enjoy making up a fun name, adopting an accent, or adding something new to their "costume" each day, like a small stuffed animal in each pocket of a vest. Teach in a way that makes you feel comfortable.
- 11. Think safety. Read the Child Safety Precautions file at AnswersVBS.com/wonderresources for more information.
- 12. Have Bible passages from the lessons bookmarked ahead of time and use your Bible throughout as noted. Show through your facial expressions and your actions the importance of the Scriptures.
- 13. Children will be at various levels of spiritual comprehension. Pray for the Lord to take the message and do with it as he wills: plant seeds, bring to salvation, or strengthen and grow those who are already believers.
- 14. Call the children by name as you interact with them. Name tags help with this.
- 15. Show love. All children, regardless of age or appearance, need to be loved. Greet them warmly each day and always be ready with smiles, encouraging words, and appropriate hugs. Be aware of your church's appropriate touching policies.
- 16. Be all there. Try to leave behind whatever is currently going on in your life and focus your attention on the children under your care.
- 17. Notice the good. Children want attention and will sometimes resort to acting up in an effort to receive even negative attention. Be proactive by noticing and praising the things they do right. Be an encourager.
- 18. Children generally rise to the level expected of them, so challenge them to work on memory verses and complete their take-home Student Guides.
- 19. Use brown lunch bags labeled with the child's name to send everything home each day.
- 20. Have fun! Teaching should be a joy for you. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:16–18).

TIPS FOR MANAGING A GROUP OF KIDS

Kids are fun, and kids have energy! Prepare to confidently lead them using the following strategies.

Attention-Getters

Call and Response—Teach the kids that when a teacher says something, they should reply with something else. Practice the following ideas so kids know your expectations for responding:

Teacher: Gotta go
 Kids: Buffalo

• **Teacher:** Better shake **Kids:** Rattlesnake

• Teacher: Chugga, chugga, chugga, chugga

Kids: Choo choo

Teacher: Crisscross (as they sit and cross legs)

Kids: Big trail boss
Teacher: Jesus loves me
Kids: This I know
Teacher: For the Bible
Kids: Tells me so

Train's a Comin'—Make the sound of an oncoming train. Start softly and slowly with the sound (chugga-chugga-choo-choo) while making circles with your arms as wheels. Gradually get louder and faster as the train approaches, then reverse the motions and sounds to finish with everyone sitting quietly.

Horse Gallop—Check online for how to use finger snaps and claps to make it sound like a horse galloping. Begin slowly, then speed up.

Rhythm Claps—The teacher claps a little rhythm, and the kids clap the exact rhythm back. Vary the clapping patterns.

Countdown—Hold up five fingers and count down from five to one. By the count of one, kids should be completely quiet.

Soft Talk—Start talking about something important very softly or in a whisper. Kids will often quiet down to hear what you are saying. Or say, "If you can hear me, clap once." Continue softly with other commands.

Flash the Lights—This is a good signal to listen up.

Lining Up to Walk Through the Building

If You . . .—For lining up, call out fun categories, such as the following:

- "If you are wearing green like a cactus, line up. Now, if you're wearing brown like a grizzly bear, line up."
- "If your birthday is during the summer, line up. Now, if your birthday is during the school year, line up."
- "If you have a dog, line up. Now, if you have a cat, line up. Now, if you have no pets, line up."
- "If you are quiet, line up."

Proactive Tips

Be Prepared—One of the best ways to ward off discipline problems is to be prepared. Think through and organize your day, leaving no downtime. Keep things moving!

This takes more effort on your part, but it's worth it.

Active Participation—Keeping kids actively engaged in the lesson is perhaps the best thing you can do to keep the class from getting rowdy. The lessons are written to be creative, fun, and full of active participation. Play the games, act out the Bible accounts, and do the other ideas listed. Occupy kids' minds and attention with good stuff!

Helpers—Involve the kids. Let them be helpers. Some kids just want to feel needed, so giving them a responsibility is a way to show you trust them. Try putting them in charge of a simple task, such as helping others learn memory verses, passing out papers, or holding a poster for the teacher. Sometimes a simple task can keep them busy and make them feel important!

Use Humor—Kids of all ages love to laugh! Have fun together. If you see a situation is getting tense or a child is getting upset for some reason, try thinking of a way to lighten the mood with humor.

Calming Rowdiness

Don't Yell—Kids may respond at first if someone yells, but they eventually dismiss it. Try some of these other ideas instead.

Separate Kids—Separate kids who misbehave around each other but encourage problem-solving when possible. "What are some things we could do to help you and ___ get along?"

Give Choices—Avoid power struggles by giving choices. If a child is resistant to doing something you've asked, try your command another way. "You can either sit with the rest of the group and listen or sit with ___ (leader's name) at the back of the room."

Praise in Public, Correct in Private—If someone does need correction, be careful not to embarrass him in front of his peers. If you need to talk to a child about a misbehavior, pull him aside while the rest of the group is distracted. Kids will be less defensive if they don't feel they have to "save face" in front of their peers—and if they feel you really care and aren't just coming down on them.

Know Church Policies—Know your church's policy for severe behavior issues. Do you take the child to your VBS director? Do you alert the child's parents? Do you involve other staff members? Be prepared.

AGE-LEVEL CHARACTERISTICS

Kids are awesome! Each one is unique and is a special creation from the hand of our amazing Creator. With all their uniqueness, however, they also share some common characteristics. That doesn't mean every child always exhibits the following characteristics at the suggested age, but these guidelines can be a benchmark to use when looking at characteristics of children as a whole. It can be helpful to see how God has wired different age groups and can be used to help us be more effective in teaching and interacting with them.

First, you'll see general characteristics of children and then specific characteristics of Pre-Primaries (ages 4–6).

CHARACTERISTICS OF CHILDREN

Children have some common characteristics.

- · They are born sinners.
- God has given each a conscience, and they generally want good to win over evil.
- God has shown himself to all children through his creation, making it obvious to all that there is a Creator.
- Children enjoy active learning—moving around; seeing, touching, smelling, and hearing things; and being involved.
- · Children need to be loved, encouraged, and praised.
- Children are rapidly growing and changing.
- Children trust the adults who are responsible for them.
- · Children can get discouraged with criticism and failure.
- Children are eager to learn and are curious about the world and God.

CHARACTERISTICS OF PRE—PRIMARIES

Physical Characteristics

Pre-Primaries are active and becoming confident in physical activities like jumping, hopping on one foot, and walking backward. They love to be moving. They're improving in hand-eye coordination. They're rapidly growing and may need rest after active play.

Takeaways for Us

Pre-Primaries like to play hard, so keep them moving with short, simple games and activities. They may need to sit and rest for a brief time afterward.

Emotional/Social Characteristics

Pre-Primaries are less fearful than Toddlers but still often exhibit common fears, such as fear of dogs and the dark. They can have emotional extremes and are testing others to see who can be controlled. They want to please adults

and want praise. They will often mimic adults' behaviors. They like imaginative play. Pre-Primaries can handle small tasks and responsibilities.

Takeaways for Us

- Let them be helpers. Give them simple jobs to do and have them help pick up things and straighten the room at the end of the lesson. Let them know they've done a good job.
- Give them opportunities to dress-up and play imaginatively.
- Be consistent in discipline. Let your "yes" be "yes" and your "no" be "no."
- Be careful to walk worthy—act and speak in godly ways. Little eyes are watching and will want to imitate you!

Spiritual/Mental Characteristics

Pre-Primaries talk a lot and ask a lot of questions, including questions about God. They understand that sin is disobeying God's commands. They need a lot of guidance in tasks but can also follow a simple series of directions. They have an attention span of approximately five minutes. They enjoy doing new things and hearing stories and songs. They're not always able to tell the difference between reality and fantasy. They're developing attitudes toward right and wrong and can do basic memory work.

Takeaways for Us

- In downtime, give them time to ask questions and be ready to patiently answer. But while you are teaching, be careful you don't get so wrapped up in letting them talk that the lesson doesn't happen!
- Vary activities often. The longer an activity goes, the more wiggly they'll become!
- When engaged in pretend activities, name them as such (e.g., "Let's pretend to be explorers!"). At the same time, point out often that God's Word is not pretend but true.
- Repetition in songs and stories works well and is enjoyed by Pre-Primaries.
- Sing the memory verse songs with them. They will be able to learn at least parts of the verses by the end of the week.
- · Use visuals.
- Teach them about sin and asking God for forgiveness.
- Show interest in each child, helping them know you care.
- Be careful to speak accurately and truthfully.
- Show care and respect for your Bible and help them see your love for it and for the Lord.

HIGH POINT BIBLE TIME

As we open God's Word in our lesson time, we will look at Jesus' life through a lens of awe and wonder. It will be the high point of our day.

The lesson time is written as a 35–40 minute period, divided into two segments: Exploration Stations (15–20 minutes) and Lesson Time (15–20 minutes). You can either keep your group together for the stations and lesson or divide the group in two, with each half switching places after 15–20 minutes.

If stations aren't possible, simply choose one or more of the station activities to incorporate into your lesson time as a whole group activity.

Exploration Station Time

There are five stations to choose from: Discovery Center, Wet Touch Table, Dry Touch Table, Dramatic Play, and Coloring Corner. See the Exploration Stations supply list on the back cover for supplies needed each day. These stations can be in the same room as the lesson time or in an adjoining room. If both the stations and the lesson time are in the same room, set them up in opposite ends of the room. Post the signs with each station's name. Leave copies of the directions and Teaching Tie-Ins at each station for group guides to reinforce.

When the children enter the stations room, you may want to have them first sit while you briefly explain each station and Teaching Tie-In. Then the children may rotate in small groups through each station every few minutes, or they may independently move from one to another, which is what our test churches do. The children don't need to do every station each day, although the coloring page should be sent home daily—colored or uncolored.

For the Touch Tables, use small wading pools or large, clear, under-the-bed storage containers partially filled

with water or other materials. Place them on a plastic tarp or tablecloth to catch the spills.

Check the Decorating Decisions section for more specifics on setting up the Dramatic Play area to look like an Old West clapboard house interior and the Coloring Corner to look like a train.

Lesson Time

The lesson time is divided into three sections:

Introduce It! (5 minutes or less): This is a time to begin the lesson in an interesting way.

Teach It! (10–15 minutes): This deepens the lesson, with costumed teachers sharing the Bible account and apologetics information.

Apply It! (Remaining time): This is the memory verse review and practical application time.

Ideas are given within the lessons to adapt the activities to your time period. There are many possibilities. Because of the content-rich lessons, a little extra time is great if you can swing it! But if not, there are lots of options, so you may want to shorten or skip some activities.

The lesson format is written for a two-person team. One person serves as Teacher One and the other as Teacher Two or the Teaching Assistant. The format also works if teaching alone. If team teaching, decide ahead of time who will teach what. If teaching alone, either find someone to help with the daily puppet script or work the puppet yourself, using a suitcase with the lid flipped up. Have the puppet appear from behind the lid.

Check the Decorating Decisions section for more specifics on decorating.

MEMORY VERSE SONGS

We have partnered with Seeds Kids Worship and Majesty Music to create songs for each of the memory verses. They feature the full verses. (Pre-Primaries and Toddlers are taught condensed versions of these verses.) Singing Scripture is an excellent way for children to easily learn their Bible verses. If you choose to use these songs (either

video or audio), use them during the memory verse time in each lesson. The Music Leader Download comes with the purchase of a Super Starter Kit and can also be purchased separately. Student CDs in packs of 10 are available if you would like each student to have a copy of the songs (1220610 or 1220620).

SPECIAL NEEDS

The Special Needs Teacher Supplement (1220530) can help you accommodate and modify these lessons for those who need it, either in your regular classroom or in a self-contained classroom.

STUDENT EXTRAS

Check with your VBS director and choose one or more of these fun optional materials to give to your students so they can take home a review of the daily lesson content.

Also, decide with your director when it will work best to give out the various items: during lesson time, during snack time (a good time to review), or at the end of the day (a good time to pass out bookmarks, student guides, and other items that need to make it home safely).

Simple Songs: The songs referenced throughout this guide that are for Pre-Primaries and Toddlers are available on the Resource Download (you'll need to upload them to an MP3 player) and on a separate *Simple Songs for Kids* CD (1221410) that you can play in a CD player. You may want to purchase a CD for each child.

Student Guides: These age-appropriate guides feature a lesson review on the front of each daily take-home paper, as well as the memory verse, verse review game suggestion, and "Go and Do" section on the back that parallels the Apply It! part of the lesson. You can either go over these during class time or send them home with the students to be completed with a parent or caretaker. This is what our test churches do. If you send the guides home, motivate the kids to do them because they are full of good information. Give them to the group guides to pass out at the end of the day. Then have the guides check with

the kids the following day to see how they did and make a big deal about their hard work. The student guides are available in packs of 10.

All Aboard Adventure Guides: These fun, interactive booklets feature the daily memory verses, animal pals, stickers, and a place to stamp (12-0-093) for attendance. Check with your VBS director to find out when to give these to the kids. They can receive them at any time during the first day. You can review them with the kids during the Apply It! section of the lesson if you have time, or group guides can go over them during snack time. These are available in packs of 10.



DECORATING DECISIONS



KEY DECORATING ELEMENTS

High Point Chapel

To serve as a focal point for the teaching, the *Wonder Junction* classroom backdrop features an Old West country chapel in a southwestern desert setting. You can create your own artwork or see the Resource Download for clip art images of the chapel scene. Use an overhead projector to enlarge and transfer the images onto corrugated cardboard sheets, foam insulation board, or roll paper, then prop them up or mount them on a wall. You can feature the entire scene or keep it simple with just the chapel against a background of sky blue roll paper or plastic tablecloths.

HOW TO ENLARGE AND TRANSFER CLIP ART

- 1. Photocopy the clip art onto transparencies.
- 2. Place roll paper or a rigid material against a wall.
- 3. Using an overhead projector to enlarge the clip art, shine the image onto the paper or rigid material, adjusting it as necessary for the size desired.
- Trace the image outlines onto the paper or rigid material.
- 5. Paint the image, if necessary, and cut out.

Classroom Scene Setter

As a quick and easy alternative to making your own class-room backdrop, a scene setter is available for purchase (1221260) from the Resource Catalog. Simply mount the panels onto a rigid material using double-sided carpet tape, clear packing tape, or staples, then prop them up with wooden supports (jacks). Or you can attach them directly to a wall with mounting putty, Mavalus tape, or double-sided tape on top of painter's tape.



Prop up your set, and any freestanding decorations, with wooden jacks made from 2 x 4, 2 x 3, or 2 x 2 boards, according to the size of your decorations. If necessary, jacks can be weighted down with bags of sand or road salt.

Resource Posters

Contained in the Teacher Resource Kit are the teaching, memory verse, and animal pal posters. These are important visuals for the kids and should be displayed in an organized fashion on a wall (or walls) adjacent to your backdrop.

Other Props, Tips & Miscellaneous Ideas

- Place a rug, or raised platform, in front of your backdrop to create a stage effect.
- Faux wood crates made from boxes, cardboard wagon wheels, coils of hemp rope, metal lanterns, and stuffed burlap sacks can be set around in groupings to fill empty spaces.
- Painted cardboard clouds, rocks, and tufts of grass can add a nice touch.
- Kids love animals, so be sure to include some in your decorating. See the Resource Download for clip art images or use a variety of stuffed animals.
- Add a thin (½-inch) black border to your painted props.
 This helps them stand out better and makes the colors appear more vibrant.
- Because corrugated cardboard tends to curl when only one side is painted, first apply a quick single coat of paint to the back.
- Don't forget to dress the part with Old West attire.

Puppet Stage

Because puppets are used daily in the Primary, Pre-Primary, and Toddler classrooms, you will need a puppet stage. Use the chapel for this purpose by cutting a small opening in one of the windows or doors or have the puppet appear from behind an outcropping of rocks. You can also make a freestanding puppet stage out of a large cardboard box or a trifold display board. Cut out a rectangular hole in the box or display board, cover the hole with fabric, and then paint or decorate the outside.

EXPLORATION STATIONS

Pre-Primary classes enjoy Exploration Stations, which include a dramatic play area, a touch table with water, a touch table with dry materials, a discovery center, and a coloring corner. Further information about these stations can be found in the lessons, but check below for details on how to set up the dramatic play area and coloring corner.

Old West Dress-Up

Your Old West dress-up area should resemble the inside of a house in the Old West. First, designate a corner of your room, then cover the walls with brown roll paper, wood grain plastic tablecloths, or a wood wall scene setter. On one wall, add a fireplace or a potbellied stove made from cardboard boxes painted black. On the other wall, add a window or two. Windows can be made by hanging squares of blue roll paper or poster board,

framing them with curtains or white or brown scalloped bulletin board trim (available at teacher supply stores or online) and adding grids made from strips of white poster board. In the center of your house, add a child's table and chairs with place settings, a centerpiece, and play food. Finish the room with various props such as an old-fashioned broom, a faux rug, stuffed burlap sacks, a wooden cradle, baskets, and a good supply of dressup clothes.

Train Coloring Corner

In another corner of your room, fashion a train from large boxes, then paint or wrap the engine and railcars in a variety of fun colors. Add a set of tracks at each end with colored masking tape. Position the train so that it encloses an area with table and chairs for the children to spend time coloring and learning their memory verses.



DEVOTION I: TREASURE JESUS

Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel. Isaiah 7:14

Imagine your young daughter comes to you one day after finishing her chores and making the daily bread. She says, "Dear parents, as you know, our people have been promised a savior for hundreds of years. Even from the beginning, Yahweh has promised that he would send one to save his people from their sins. Today, an angel told me I would bear the Promised One! Mom, Dad—our Savior is coming! And it's true what our prophet Isaiah said over 700 years ago—I have known no man, yet I am with child."

Would you think she was crazy? Would you call to mind all the promises from the Law and the Prophets you've been taught since your childhood, mulling over each one, waiting to see if more than this one spoken by Isaiah would come to pass through your daughter and her child? Would you tick each one off your mental checklist?

- He was the child of a woman (Genesis 3:15). Check.
- Micah said he would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2). Check.
- Solomon said kings would worship him (Psalm 72:10– 11). Check.
- Hosea said he would be called out of Egypt (Hosea 11:1). Check.

Is it really possible that one child could fulfill all these promises? Was your daughter telling the truth those many months ago? Could this child, whose name means "the Lord saves," really be the promised one?

Those shepherds who came to visit the baby, wanting to see the Savior that had been born to us, Christ the Lord—did they really know what they were talking about? Is it our Savior? . . . This is our Savior!

As you read the passages revealing the events surrounding the birth of Christ for the umpteenth time, meditate on the events that set his birth apart from all others—the fulfillment of prophecy, the worship of shepherds and kings, the lowly manger cradling the King of kings. As you share the good news of the Creator who stepped into history as a baby, make sure your children know that this was no ordinary baby. This is Immanuel, God with us.

May we pray as the Puritans did:

- O God, take me in spirit to the watchful shepherds, and enlarge my mind;
- Let me hear good tidings of great joy, and hearing, believe, rejoice, praise, adore,
- My conscience bathed in an ocean of repose, my eyes uplifted to a reconciled Father;
- Place me with ox, ass, camel, goat, to look with them upon my redeemer's face,
- And in him account myself delivered from sin; Let me with Simeon clasp the new-born child to my heart, embrace him with undying faith, exulting that he is mine and I am his.
- In him thou hast given me so much that heaven can give no more.

EXPLORATION STATIONS

Discovery Center: Creation Rubbings

MATERIALS

- ☐ Variety of creation-oriented items such as leaves, thin bark, flattened flowers and clovers, craft feathers, fun foam sun and stars, fabric with a reptile texture, etc.
- □ Crayons
- ☐ White paper, at least 1 piece per child
- ☐ Optional: parchment paper and heavy books

PREP

Remove wrappers from the crayons. Gather the creation supplies. These can be items like fun foam creation shapes, or they can be real items. To use real items, flatten them ahead of time between two pieces of parchment paper placed beneath a heavy book for a few days.

DIRECTIONS

Students put the items under the paper. Show them how to rub their crayons sideways over the paper to get the creation impressions. Write their names on their papers when they're done.

TEACHING TIE-IN

The Bible tells us Jesus is the Creator! He made leaves, and bark, and flowers, and animals, and the sun, moon, stars, and people! Jesus and his creation are a wonder!

Wet Touch Table: Wash the Babies

MATERIALS

- □ Touch table with tarp underneath
- □ Water
- ☐ Waterproof dolls and baby bath supplies such as plastic cups, play soap or baby bath, bath toys, wash-cloths and towels

PREP

Partially fill the touch table with water. Add the items into the touch table.

DIRECTIONS

Students enjoy giving the babies a bath.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Do you think Jesus ever needed a bath when he was a baby? Pause for responses. Jesus got dirty just like we do, because he was a person like us. We all were babies at one time, and so was Jesus! But there's one big difference. He was the most special baby ever born because he is also God!

Dry Touch Table: Christmas Fun

MATERIALS

☐ Touch table with tarp underneath

- ☐ Generic filler (crinkle shred or Easter grass—red and green would be fun today)
- □ Plastic, safe Christmas items such as plastic nativity pieces, nonbreakable ornaments, Christmas cookie cutters, etc.

PREP

Put the filler in the table along with the Christmas items.

DIRECTIONS

Students play with the Christmas items.

TEACHING TIE-IN

When do we use these items? Christmas. Right, at Christmas! But what does Christmas have to do with Jesus? Pause for responses. We celebrate Jesus' birth at Christmas time. People all over the world celebrate the birth of Jesus because it's a wonder that God came down to earth in the form of a person, Jesus! God actually had skin and elbows and fingerprints!

Dramatic Play: Old West Dress-Up

MATERIALS

This station can be as simple or elaborate as you like. Leave it set up all week. Add in new items each day. Choose from the following or add in your own ideas. Make sure all items are safe for young children.

- ☐ Clapboard house interior backdrop as listed in Decorating Decisions
- □ Old West house items (e.g., small wooden table and chairs, barrels, baskets, lanterns, play food [eggs, cheese, bread, etc.], stick horses, tin plates, bowls, cooking utensils, broom, blankets, play tools, family Bible—note: it could get damaged)
- □ Old West dress-up items (e.g., bandanas, boots, cowboy hats, flannel shirts, pioneer bonnets, dresses, aprons, vests [see toddler crafts for vest instructions])
- □ Day 1 items: baby cradle, baby dolls, and old-fashioned baby supplies

PREI

Set up the area to look like the inside of an Old Western house. Add some Old West house items, dress-up items, and Day 1 items.

Vests can be made from bolts of felt (from the fabric store) or, for a more inexpensive version, from large brown grocery sacks. Ask your local grocery store to donate the sacks. Cut a neck hole in the "bottom" of the sack and armholes on the sides. Cut down the middle front from the neck hole to the top of the sack. Make sure to not cut the back of the sack.

DIRECTIONS

Dress up and pretend to be living in the Old West. Have some dolls to play with today to coordinate with the teaching.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Jesus came to earth as a baby. Do any of you have little baby brothers or sisters? Pause for responses. What are things you need to do to take care of them? Pause for responses. Jesus had to be fed and rocked and cared for, too, even though he was God! What a wonder!

Coloring Corner: John 1:14

MATERIALS

- □ Day 1 Memory Verse Coloring Sheet
- Decorating supplies to make a train as listed in Decorating Decisions
- ☐ Markers or crayons in a small galvanized bucket
- □ Optional supplies: glue sticks, stickers, and items to glue onto the coloring sheet (e.g., cotton balls, pompoms, feathers, sand paper, and tissue paper)

PREP

Set up the Old West train decorations. Print the **MEMORY VERSE COLORING SHEET**, 1 per child. Gather the decorating supplies and set them out to use all week.

DIRECTIONS

Color the sheet. Add additional supplies if desired.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Practice saying the memory verse on the sheet. Discuss its meaning.

Additional Exploration Station Ideas

- ☐ Campfire Reading—Make a fake campfire with seating around it. Place a basket or pail nearby with a variety of children's books, including children's picture Bibles and accurate books about creation, Jesus, and the Old West.
- □ Old West Animals—Borrow or buy stuffed or plastic animals and free play with them. See a possible list on the Old West A to Z page in the Director Guide.
- ☐ Flannel Board Fun—Provide a flannel board with people and items from each day's Bible lesson, along with animals and Old West items.

- ☐ Panning for Gold—Place a wading pool with a tarp underneath on the floor. Add play sand, gold coins, and other trinkets. Have kids "pan for gold" using sand sifter/sieve beach toys.
- ☐ Weigh the Gold—Gather various gold and silver items, such as play coins, painted rocks, jewelry, etc., along with a pan balance (available online or at teacher stores or search online for "how to make a balance scale"). Kids have fun weighing items and trying to get them to balance.
- ☐ Texture Trays—Provide various textures for kids to trace words or pictures with their fingers. Use key words of Bible concepts they're learning about. Possible textures include shaving cream or hair gel in zippered baggies (duct-taped shut), burlap, trays of salt, thick fleece, magic slates, or chalkboard and chalk. Supervise carefully and make sure they know not to put their hands in their mouths. You may want to put out different textures on different days. Provide wipes for cleanup.
- □ Play Dough—Play dough is always a favorite, so feature a station with it all week, adding thematic supplies (e.g., cookie cutters and plastic toys) that have to do with the day's teaching, such as nature items on Day 1 (Jesus is Creator); construction items on Day 2 (Jesus is a carpenter); boats, fish, and storm/weather items on Day 3 (Jesus is Almighty); hearts and crosses on Day 4 (Jesus is Savior); and crowns on Day 5 (Jesus is King of kings).

PLAY DOUGH RECIPE

- □ 2 c. flour □ 2 t. oil
- ☐ ½ c. salt ☐ Food coloring
- ☐ 2 c. warm water ☐ Optional: glitter
- ☐ 4 t. cream of tartar

Mix the first five ingredients in a saucepan. After blended, mix in food coloring. Stir over low to medium heat until the dough is formed and is no longer sticky. Remove from the pan and knead until smooth, adding the glitter if using it. After it has cooled, store in an air-tight container.

INTRODUCE IT!

Wonder Junction Train Depot and Chapel (5 minutes)

At the start of each day's lesson, you will introduce the kids to different places in Wonder Junction. Today, it's the train depot and chapel.

Prep: Prepare your costumes. Bookmark all the Scripture verses used in today's lesson. Hide the baby doll so it is still partially visible. Remember to hide it again for the next group coming in.

Teacher 1: Well howdy, y'all! It sure is good to meet ya. I'm ___, and this here is ___. This week, we're going to pretend we're living in the Old West. When you think Old West, you've gotta think cowboys, and horses, and gold mines, and old towns like this. Show the **WONDER JUNCTION POSTER.**

Teacher 2: And trains! Trains were a new invention back then. Point out where the train depot is on the poster. Come on! Let's take a ride on the train and head to the town of Wonder Junction! Have everyone get up and pretend to do so. Have them grab their luggage, get on board as you say, "All aboard!" and pretend to chuq around the room. Blow the train whistle if you have one. Come to a screeching halt at Wonder Junction, ending in front of the chapel, where they sit down.

Teacher 1: Now here we are in Wonder Junction. Isn't it awesome? We'll be meeting right here each day at High Point Chapel, a mighty important building in our town. Point to the church on the WONDER JUNCTION POSTER.

Teacher 2: You know, it's a wonder to see the West with all its gold and beautiful land, don't you think? But you know what? We're going to be talking about something even more wonderful—the wonder of Jesus!

Teacher 1: Have y'all ever heard of Jesus before? Pause for nods. Let's first talk about the wonder of Jesus' birth. Being born has to do with babies. Look around the room. Can you find a baby doll? Have them point to it. Get the doll and hold it up.

Teacher 2: Now listen to this wonderful thought. Jesus, who is God, became a baby! Jesus creates babies because he's the Creator of all people! But then Jesus became a baby himself, the most special baby ever! There's never been such an important person born, and there never will be again.

Teacher 1: You mean Jesus, who is God and who lived in heaven, became a little baby who cries and spits up and needs to be fed and changed and cared for?

Teacher 2: Yes, siree! It's a wonder to think on, for sure. Let's talk about it more as we hear how he came to earth as a baby.

TEACH IT!

Part 1: Wonder of Jesus' Birth (10 minutes)

Prep: Think through your costumes/props ahead of time and have them ready to have the kids put on or hold at the right time. Cover each section of the WONDER-FILLED BIRTH POSTER with a sheet of copy paper.

Wonder 1: Angel

Teacher 1: The Bible tells us right here in the beginning (point to your open Bible at the book of Genesis) that God created the heavens and the earth. Jesus, who is God and God's Son, created everything with God the Father and God the Holy Spirit! Jesus made the birds (let's be a bird!), and the fish (let's be a fish!), and the horses (let's slap our legs to gallop like a horse), and people (let's say hi to each other!). But if we skip over to here (point to your open Bible at the book of Luke), we find out that at one point in time, Jesus the Creator came down from heaven to live in his creation. That is a wonder!

Teacher 2: Let's begin at the place when it's almost time for Jesus to be born. We'll need someone to help us out. Would anyone like to come up and be an angel? Choose someone and have them stand up front until the next direction.

Teacher 1: Angels came from heaven when God sent them to earth with special messages. Jesus' birth account starts with a visit from an angel. That doesn't happen every day, does it? We can see Jesus' birth is going to be different. Let's put a white robe (or something white) on the angel. Do so.

Teacher 2: The Bible tells us the angel's name was Gabriel. Address the angel. Angel, what's your name? Have the angel say "Gabriel." Everyone say, "Hi, Gabriel!" Do so.

Teacher 1: Read Luke 1:28. Angel, can you greet Mary? Do so.

Teacher 2: Well, this made Mary afraid. Can you imagine all of a sudden if an angel from heaven was in a room with you? Make a face to show how you might feel. Do so.

Teacher 1: The angel told Mary not to be afraid because God had chosen her to be Jesus' mother. Now, do angels normally come to our houses and announce that a family will have a baby? No! This doesn't normally happen. But it did for Jesus' birth, and it was a wonder! Uncover the WONDER-FILLED BIRTH POSTER: ANGEL.

Teacher 2: Everything happened just as the angel said.

Teacher 1: She married a man named Joseph, and they traveled to a city called Bethlehem because the government wanted to count all the people.

Teacher 2: While they were there, it was time to have baby Jesus. Because their family's home was filled with people, they were given an area in the lower level of the home that sometimes had animals in it. Let's make donkey and cow sounds. Do so.

Teacher 1: Mary had the baby and laid him in an animal's feeding stand, called a manger.

Teacher 2: This sure wasn't the nicest place for the King of the world to be born, was it? He could have been born in a palace or had fireworks or a big parade. But instead, he came quietly and was placed in a manger. Now think about how amazing it is that God himself came as a baby. God had fingernails! God had elbows! God had toes! What a wonder!

Wonder 2: Shepherd

Teacher 1: Let's have our angel sit down and have a shepherd come up now to hear the next thing that happened. Choose someone to be a shepherd. Give her the staff.

Teacher 2: Do you know what a shepherd does? Take responses. Shepherds take care of sheep. Give her the toy sheep. Taking care of sheep is hard work. The shepherd has to make sure there's plenty of grass and water for the sheep. Can you pretend to feed your sheep, Miss/Mr. Shepherd(ess)? Do so.

Teacher 1: And the shepherd has to make sure the sheep don't wander off or get eaten by wild animals. Shepherds can have some pretty exciting times! But I know for sure what I'm about to tell you is the most exciting thing that's ever happened to any shepherd. Let's make an excited face. Do so.

Teacher 2: The Bible tells us on the night Jesus was born, the shepherds, who were nearby, were watching over their sheep. Can you pretend you're watching over your sheep, Miss Shepherdess? Do so. Suddenly, they saw something that scared them. Look scared, Miss Shepherdess! Do so.

Teacher 1: What do you think it was? Take responses. Yes, it was an angel! The angel said not to be afraid because a Savior, Jesus, was born. Let's jump up and down and shout, "Hooray!" Do so.

Teacher 2: The angel told them they would go and find the baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger.

Teacher 1: Then guess what happened next? Uncover the WONDER-FILLED BIRTH POSTER: SHEP-HERDS. A whole bunch of angels filled the sky, celebrating Jesus' birth! What a wonder! Everyone, pretend to look up and ooh and aah at a sky full of angels. Do so.

Teacher 2: The shepherds hurried to Bethlehem to see the baby. Miss Shepherdess, can you run around the room as you pretend to hurry to Bethlehem? Do so or have everyone do so. When they got there, it was just as the angel said it would be. They found baby Jesus in the manger, and they worshipped him.

Teacher 1: Have any of you visited a newborn baby? Pause for responses. Was the baby in a hospital? Pause for responses. There certainly weren't angels and the baby wasn't in a manger, right? Does this sound like a normal birth? Pause for responses. No! Only Jesus' birth! What a wonder!

Wonder 3: Wise Men and a Special Star

- **Teacher 2:** Our shepherd can sit down now, and we need a wise man to come up. Choose someone and hand him a gift.
- **Teacher 1:** Jesus continued to have amazing things happen. When he was a little older, wise men with special gifts came to visit. Let's say hi to our wise man. Do so.
- **Teacher 2:** The wise men came because they had been watching for a special star to appear. When they saw it, they followed it to find Jesus. Can you follow me around, Mr. Wise Man? Hold up the star and walk around leading just the Wise Man (or everyone). If you have time, you may want to weave around a bit. Then uncover the WONDER-FILLED BIRTH POSTER: WISE MEN WITH GIFTS/SPECIAL STAR.
- **Teacher 1:** Wow! Jesus even had his own special star in the sky. Do you think there's ever been a special star for anyone else's birth? Pause. No! Only Jesus!
- **Teacher 2:** The star led the wise men along until it stood over the house where Jesus was. When they saw the star, they were so, so happy! And they came into the house and saw Jesus and his mother, Mary. They worshipped Jesus and gave him expensive treasures—gold, frankincense, and myrrh.
- **Teacher 1:** That would be like rich, important people showing up at your house after you were born and giving you expensive gifts. How would you like that? Pause for responses.
- **Teacher 2:** Have you noticed how Jesus' birth was different from the very beginning? His birth was not like any other person's birth ever. He had angels. He had shepherds. Later, he had wise men bringing gifts. He even had his own special star!
- **Teacher 1:** Jesus' birth was so special because God himself came to earth and was born. His birth is what we celebrate every Christmas Day! No one else has a day like this that people all over the world celebrate. Only Jesus! What a wonder! Our wise man can sit down as we talk about one more wonder of Jesus' birth.

Wonder 4: Jesus Came!

- **Teacher 2:** Maybe the most amazing wonder of all is Jesus wanting to come. Remember, he was in heaven in a beautiful, perfect place, and he left that for our world.
- **Teacher 1:** Uncover the WONDER-FILLED BIRTH POSTER: MANSION. That might be like us leaving a nice home—like a mansion—to go to a dirty, smelly place. And not only that, but he is a king. Imagine a king with all his riches in a beautiful castle. The king gives all that up to become a poor person in a place where nobody knows he's the king.
- **Teacher 2:** Jesus did that because he loves you and knows you need him. We'll hear more about that this week. Move behind the puppet set while Teacher 1 finishes this section.
- **Teacher 1:** But let's end by cheering for Jesus and his amazing birth! Do so. There has never been a more important person born, and there never will be again. God himself came and is with us now. Jesus is called Immanuel, which means "God is with us!" If you ever feel scared or alone, remember—Jesus is always with his children who trust in him. Even though you can't see him, he's right here. Let's talk to our puppet pal about Jesus.

This can be a good time to sing one of the songs found at the end of today's lesson.

Part 2: Puppet Pal—Jesus Is a Treasure (5 minutes or less)

Prep: Tape one **PUPPET SCRIPT** inside the puppet stage and attach the other to a clipboard for reference. Dress the puppet in either a VBS T-shirt (see Teaching Tip in the sidebar) or in an Old West costume such as a mini vest and a little bandana. Tape the mini shovel to the puppet's hand.

Each day, the puppet pal will teach part of the lesson or reinforce what the kids just heard. It's always a favorite, so try to include it even if you have to cut something else.

Decide which of you will be the puppet and figure out when you need to leave the previous teaching so you will be positioned in time for the start of the Puppet Pal time.

If you don't have a teaching assistant or co-teacher, enlist someone (a group guide or other volunteer) ahead of time to work the puppet each day. If you're alone, have the puppet come up from behind a suitcase with the lid flipped up or just stand and work the puppet. (It's fine if your lips move. No need to be a ventriloguist.)

You can use either a boy or a girl puppet named Sam (short for Samuel or Samantha). Use a consistent voice for the puppet all week. Speak clearly and exaggerate words and expressions. For instance, draw out certain words for emphasis or make an exaggerated action for things like groaning, turning its head, or sneezing. Use your free hand to do things with the puppet's hands or arms. For example, if the puppet is "thinking," put the puppet's hand on its chin. When the puppet is talking, make sure the mouth is open. (This is the opposite of what people often do!) In other words, the mouth should be open on most syllables. You don't have to open very wide, which will help you move the mouth faster and more naturally.

Your puppet should come in through the chapel window or from behind an outcropping of rocks. (See Decorating Decisions.) When the puppet is entering, hold your arm back and down and have the puppet take three steps up, getting higher each time, until the puppet is out and visible. When exiting, turn the puppet toward you and take three steps down until out of sight.

Teacher: Our puppet's name is Samuel (Samantha). He (she) likes to be called Sam for short. Let's all call for him (her) now. Do so.

Puppet: Come up acting dejected with a mini shovel taped to your hand

Teacher: Hi there, Sam. Is something wrong? You seem a bit upset.

Puppet: Well, my friend was supposed to go digging for gold treasure with me today at the Wonder Junction Gold Mine, but now he's too busy.

Teacher: Oh, I'm sorry to hear that.

Puppet: Yeah. He promised he'd come.

Teacher: Well, when people make promises, hopefully they keep them. But once in a while, they don't.

Puppet: That's terrible!

Teacher: Yes. But I have good news for you.

Puppet: What? Did you find some gold treasure?

Teacher: No, but in a way, I found a treasure much better than gold. I found the one person who always, always, eeps his promises. He's a treasure.

Puppet: Goody! Who is he?

Teacher: Jesus. Jesus never fails. People in this world may let you down, but Jesus never will. He always keeps his promises.

Puppet: How do you know that?

Teacher: Well, you know how we talked about his birth today? All those things that happened when Jesus was born had been promised in the Bible long before they happened. Point to each one on the PROPHECY POSTER as you mention it. Jesus was born in a town called Bethlehem, just as the Bible promised. His mother laid him in a manger and named him Jesus, just as promised. Later, wise men followed a special star and came with gifts, just as the Bible promised. All these promises happened just as the Bible said they would.

Puppet: Jesus even left the beauty of heaven to come to earth. He's a promise keeper. That's a much better treasure than finding gold.

Teacher: Jesus is a treasure because he loves us, and he's with us—Immanuel.

Puppet: Jesus really is a wonder, isn't he?

- ★ The puppet can be dressed in a small VBS T-shirt or a mini cowboy hat and little bandana. To make a small T-shirt, print, cut out, and laminate a color copy of the VBS logo and tape it to a baby-sized T-shirt.
- ★ If you want to get snazzy, use a quick musical introduction and exit when it's time for the puppet to come and go.

- **Teacher:** He's the treasure of all treasures—better than ___ mention some things and have them come up with several, too, like: Jesus is a better treasure than living in a castle, having all the toys in the world, etc. Always treasure Jesus, Sam.
- **Puppet:** I will! Well, I think I'm going to try to dig up some gold treasure on my own now, but I'll remember—Jesus is our true treasure!

Teacher: Okay! Bye for now, Sam! See you tomorrow.

Part 3: Animal Pal Review (5 minutes or less)

Take a couple minutes to summarize the lesson today using the DAY 1 ANIMAL PAL POSTER, using any or all of the questions below. Pass out the Wonder Junction maps and Tiny stickers (available to purchase from Answers VBS.com), one set per person. This week, children will add one animal pal each day as they learn about them. If you have a larger group, you don't need to put names on them—this saves time passing them out each day.

Let's take a look at our animal pal poster to remember what we talked about today. What kind of animal is our animal pal? Cougar kitten. Cougars are a kind of wild cat. If you lived out West in the olden days, you may have run into one! Now—what's our cougar's name? Tiny. What does a tiny baby cougar have to do with Jesus? Both of them were tiny and newborn. Tiny the Cougar reminds us of Jesus coming as a tiny baby. What wonderful things happened when Jesus was born? Answers will vary.

Continue reviewing with the following questions. Be sure to give the correct answer for any "no" questions. Have the kids meow like a cougar kitten if the answer is yes and pretend to sleep if it is no.

- 1. Yes or no: Jesus didn't start as a baby. He has always been alive. Yes—meow like a cougar kitten.
- 2. Yes or no: Jesus is Creator of the world. Yes—meow.
- 3. Yes or no: Jesus is not God. No—pretend to sleep like a cougar kitten. Jesus is God the Son.
- **4.** Yes or no: Jesus' birth was just like everyone else's birth. No—pretend to sleep. He's the most important person to ever be born and his birth was the most special birth ever.
- 5. Yes or no: Jesus had angels, shepherds, wise men, and a special star involved with his birth. Yes—meow.
- 6. Yes or no: People all over the world celebrate Jesus' birth at Christmas. Yes—meow.

Nugget of Truth

Ready for an important question? Yes or no: Should we always be in wonder when we think of Jesus? Yes! Jesus is amazing! He knows exactly how many hairs are on your head ... right now! He knows what you'll be wearing 10 years from now on a Thursday! He knows how you'll be feeling tomorrow morning. You can talk to him. He is with everyone that trusts in him. Remember, his name Immanuel means "God is with us."

APPLY IT!

In the remaining time, complete one or more of the following ideas in class. You won't have time to do them all, but these ideas are also on the back of the Pre-Primary Student Guide. Send the student guides home each day as a fun review and also encourage the kids to do the practical ideas (the Go and Do sections) that apply today's lesson to real life. They're important!

Supplies for this section are not included in the supply list on the back cover since they will vary depending on the activities you choose. So decide what you will do and add any items to your supply list accordingly.

- 3. Talk to God (pray) and thank him for sending his Son, Jesus, from heaven to earth as a person yet still God. Thank him for loving you that much. Thank him for understanding what you go through because he went through it too.



DEVOTION 2: FOLLOW JESUS

For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps. 1 Peter 2:21

Imagine being a young boy and having a friend whose dad was a carpenter. He helped his dad around his shop and invited you in for a meal after a day of tending your sheep. Indeed, your father had encouraged you to befriend the carpenter's son. Apparently, your dad had been there the night of his birth and had experienced something indescribable.

In your teen years, your eyes couldn't help but roll every time your dad asked you to gather the sheep *again*. But your friend always obeyed his parents right away—all the way—cheerfully without complaining. While you got hangry, he never did. He also calmed you down when you were "righteously angry" at the latest injustices experienced by your people.

This young man seemed to make friends with the animals he fitted for yokes. And his tears flowed when his beloved pet donkey died. He enjoyed a good joke—but never at someone's expense. He seemed to know things that no one else knew. Everyone gravitated toward the serious young man who taught even the teachers.

After you married and began having kids, he celebrated birthdays and anniversaries with you, bringing children presents that he had made in his wood shop. Strangely enough, his own birthday never seemed important to him—he always seemed older than he was anyway.

Later, you watched as a crowd gathered around to listen to your friend teach. His teachings were astounding—to turn the other cheek when the Roman oppressors struck? To give them all you had when they asked? To love them after years of ingrained hatred? Perfection was the standard set by God in order to gain heaven? The kingdom of God was near?

And then you both attended the wedding of a mutual friend, and somehow, he changed the water you'd just sipped into the best wine you'd ever tasted. Surely, no ordinary man could do that!

Could this man, your lifelong friend, really be the one? The Messiah who had been promised for hundreds of years? Has your Deliverer come? . . . Yes, the Deliverer has come!

As you study the passages about Jesus' childhood, scant though they are, meditate on the differences between the children you know and the child he was. Think about what other religions teach and claim. *Superior* doesn't even begin to describe Jesus compared to everyone else. And yet, this Creator-Redeemer has called us to learn from him, to imitate him, and to follow him.

As you share with the children today, try to convey the sense of wonder and awe that he inspires in what he teaches and does, encouraging them to follow after this God-Man, Jesus Christ.

May we pray as the Puritans prayed:

I bless thee that thou hast made me capable of knowing thee, the author of all being,

Of resembling thee, the perfection of all excellency, Of enjoying thee, the source of all happiness.

Let my religion be more obvious to my conscience, more perceptible to those around.

While Jesus is representing me in heaven, may I reflect him on earth,

While he pleads my cause, may I show forth his praise.

Continue the gentleness of thy goodness towards me,

And whether I wake or sleep, let thy presence go with me, thy blessing attend me.

Thou hast led me on and I have found thy promises true.

Thy vows are ever upon me, and I praise thee, O God.

What is this family doing together? Take responses. Maybe they're going on a trip. Sometimes families go on trips together. Jesus' family took a trip together for a celebration. They went to a city called Jerusalem.

Dry Touch Table: Build-It-Yourself Woodworking

MATERIALS

☐ Touch table with tarp underneath

- ☐ Safe play woodworking supplies, such as smooth wood pieces in various small sizes, building blocks, egg cartons (flipped upside down)
- ☐ Play hammers, screwdrivers, and woodworking tools
- ☐ Play tool belt or carpenter's apron

PREP

Put the assorted supplies in the table.

DIRECTIONS

Explain what a carpenter is. Instruct the kids to pretend they are a carpenter and to build something.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Jesus' earthly father was a carpenter. That's a person who makes things out of wood or stone. He may have taught Jesus a lot about being a carpenter. The Bible calls Jesus a carpenter. What kinds of things do you think Jesus made out of wood or stone? Take responses. Do you think it would be fun to be a carpenter? Take responses. Jesus was a real person like you. But he is also God. What a wonder!

Dramatic Play: Old West Dress-Up

MATERIALS

- ☐ Materials from previous day
- ☐ Wooden, old-fashioned-looking toys (e.g., animals, tops, train, blocks)
- ☐ Carpenter aprons with tool pockets

PREP

Use previous day materials. Add in the wooden toy items and aprons.

DIRECTIONS

Kids dress up and play with the items.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Kids during Jesus' time would have had a lot to do, but they would have played a little too. Same with kids in the Old West. All kids like to play, right? I wonder what Jesus liked to play. What do you like to play? Take responses.

INTRODUCE IT!

Wonder Junction Schoolhouse (5 minutes)

As we explore this topic, we have looked only to the Bible for our source material. Check out AnswersVBS.com/wonderfaq for more info.

Prep: Bookmark all the Scripture verses used in today's lesson.

- **Teacher 1:** Howdy again, partners! Glad to see ya back at Wonder Junction. Yesterday, we talked about Jesus, the Creator, coming to his creation as a baby. How many of you have had a baby in your house? Pause for nods. Well, after a bit, that newborn baby grows into a little kid, right?
- **Teacher 2:** And kids go to school, right? Sometimes it's in a school building and sometimes it's at home, but still, kids are learning!
- **Teacher 1:** Do any of you go to preschool? Pause for nods. Well, in our pretend town of Wonder Junction, some of the kids go to school in the one-room schoolhouse. Miss Winnie Griggs is the teacher. She used to live out east, but she took the train here and arrived with her trunk full of books and papers and even a globe! Show the schoolhouse on the WONDER JUNCTION POSTER.
- **Teacher 2:** Kids during Bible times would have been learning too. Jesus himself, even though he was God, was learning things because he was also a kid! In fact, at one point, Jesus was the same age you are now. Isn't that a wonder to think about?
- **Teacher 1:** It is a wonder! Jesus was like you in many ways. For instance, stand up if you like to eat yummy food. Do so. Turn around if you like to play. Do so. Wave your hand if you like to get a nice hug. Do so. Jesus would have liked to experience things like that too.
- **Teacher 2:** But there was one huge difference. Jesus wasn't just a kid—he is also God!

 That made for a childhood that was different than any other child's. Let's hear more about it!

JEACH JT!

Part 1: Jesus at the Temple (5-10 minutes)

Prep: Make or buy a simple carpenter's apron with pockets that can hold the props/pictures mentioned in this section. At the time of this writing, they are available at Walmart under the name "Hyper Tough Cotton Canvas 2 Pocket Apron." Cut apart the JESUS AT THE TEMPLE POSTERS, and put the props and poster pictures in the apron. To make a scroll, roll up a piece of paper from both ends and tie it with a ribbon. Optional: Laminate the posters or roll them up.

Teacher 1: ___ (Teacher 2) is going to put on this carpenter's apron to tell you more about Jesus' childhood because guess what job Jesus' dad had? Take responses. He was a carpenter! Jesus grew up as a carpenter's son in a town called Nazareth.

Teacher 2: Take a hammer out of the apron pocket and have them all pretend to hammer something. Now, if you are a boy, stand up. Do so. What's something you like to do? Take quick responses or give prompts. Well, Jesus would have been a normal boy in many ways. The Bible tells us he grew and became strong and full of wisdom (Luke 2:40). Let's all scrunch way down and pretend to grow taller and taller! Do so.

Teacher 1: Can you think of any first words little kids say when they are learning to talk? Take responses. Yes, mama, dadda, bye-bye, etc. Well, Jesus learned to talk, too, and would have continued talking throughout his whole childhood.

Teacher 2: But guess what? The Bible only has one thing written down that Jesus said while he was a child. This happened when he was 12. Let's count to 12 as we jump 12 times. Do so.

- **Teacher 1:** Jesus' family traveled a long way to a festival in a city called Jerusalem. Let's walk around the room and pretend we're heading to Jerusalem. Do so and stay standing.
- **Teacher 2:** When they got there, they went to the temple, which is kind of like our church. Take the JESUS AT THE TEMPLE POSTER 1 out of your apron pocket and show it. Let's sit back down at our High Point Chapel. Do so.
- Teacher 1: There were some really smart teachers there who read and taught God's Word.
- **Teacher 2:** Take a scroll from your apron. Nowadays, God's Word, the Bible, is a book. Back then, it was a scroll. The shape is different, but the words we read are still the same.
- **Teacher 1:** Jesus sat in the temple, learning more about God. At the same time, he was also teaching the teachers, even though he was only 12! The Bible says they were completely amazed (astonished) at him.
- **Teacher 2:** Finally, it was time to go home. But guess what happened? Jesus' parents couldn't find him in the traveling group they were with. Have you ever gotten lost or separated from your parents? Pause for nods. It's so scary!
- **Teacher 1:** Jesus was not with his parents! Yikes! In fact, they couldn't find Jesus for *three* whole days!
- **Teacher 2:** The good news is, they finally found Jesus safe and sound. Where do you think he was? Pause for responses. In the temple, still teaching the teachers! Take the JESUS AT THE TEMPLE POSTER 2 out of your apron pocket and show it.
- **Teacher 1:** Jesus told his parents that he had to be doing his Father God's business. Even when Jesus was a child, he knew he was on a special mission for God.
- **Teacher 2:** Then Jesus left the temple with his parents, and they all went home together. Let's pretend to walk back to Jesus' home in the town of Nazareth. Do so, discreetly moving behind the puppet stage while Teacher 1 takes the kids around the room.
- Teacher 1: Now let's hear a little more about Jesus' childhood with our puppet pal.

This is a good transitional time to sing one of the songs found at the end of this lesson.

Part 2: Puppet Pal—Jesus as a Child (5 minutes)

Prep: Tape one **PUPPET SCRIPT** inside the puppet stage and attach the other to a clipboard for reference. Get the play food ready with a piece of tape on the back, but don't tape it on the puppet's hand yet.

Teacher: Let's do something silly and call for Samuel (Samantha) 12 times since we just talked about Jesus being 12 years old. Do so, counting on your fingers.

Puppet: Come up grumbling and grumpy.

Teacher: What's the problem, Sam? You don't seem happy today.

Puppet: I'm not! I'm just sooo hungry. And being hungry makes me grumpy.

Teacher: Well, how about a cracker? Would that help? Stick the play food to the puppet's hand.

Puppet: Oh, yes, thank you! Nibble on the food while the conversation continues.

Teacher: You know, even though Jesus is completely God, he was also completely human, so he got hungry too.

Puppet: He got hungry like I do?

Teacher: He sure did.

Puppet: I wonder if he ever had pizza? Boy, would I love a pizza right about now!

Teacher: Pizza wasn't popular yet, but he definitely would've needed to eat something.

Puppet: Well, how about this: Did Jesus ever get tired?

Teacher: Yep. The Bible tells of lots of times Jesus was tired.

Puppet: Wow. God got tired and hungry. That's a wonder.

Teacher: It is. And that's not all. He had feelings like you do. Jesus sometimes got sad and even cried. Of course, he was happy too.

Puppet: Did he get scared or worried? Sometimes I do when I'm alone in my dark bedroom and I start thinking about monsters under my bed. Shiver.

Teacher: No, Jesus didn't get scared or worried. He had feelings like you, but because he is God, he is perfect. He never complained, and he never got mad about something selfish.

Puppet: That doesn't sound like me. I know I'm not perfect. I get scared and complain a lot when I'm unhappy.

Teacher: Well, let's talk about a few ways Jesus would have been like us, because he was also a person. And think of a few ways he wouldn't have been like us, because he is also God. First of all, Jesus would have had birthdays.

Puppet: Fun! My birthday is February 12th. I wonder what day his birthday was.

Teacher: We don't know exactly which day, but we celebrate it on December 25, Christmas Day. Isn't it a wonder to think of God having a birthday?

Puppet: What else?

Teacher: Like some of us, Jesus had (half) brothers and sisters. Kids, do you have any brothers or sisters? Pause for nods.

Puppet: If you do, you have something like Jesus had!

Teacher: He also came from a poor family. Many people don't have lots of money.

Puppet: Yeah. My family can't go on fancy vacations and buy special stuff all the time.

Teacher: That's true of lots of people. Now here's a super amazing thought that makes us understand how different Jesus was. Because he is God, he *always* obeyed his parents. He never rolled his eyes or had a bad attitude. He didn't grab the last cookie for himself, because he was perfect and always did the right thing. Can you imagine never, ever, ever hitting your brother or being grumpy or fussing about something? What a wonder!

Puppet: I don't even make it through a day without fussing or complaining. And I sometimes snatch the last cookie so my brother won't get it.

Teacher: Me too. But the most amazing thing is that although Jesus was a child, he was also King of the whole world! He *made* the world.

Puppet: Wow, that is crazy amazing!

Teacher: Jesus is a wonder—fully God and fully man. We should love him, adore him, and be in awe of him.

Puppet: And obey him!

Teacher: Yes, and obey him! Well, it's time to move on, so let's say goodbye to Sam for now. Talk to the puppet. I think you should go get that pizza you were craving.

Puppet: Pepperoni and double cheese, here I come! Bye! Exit.

Part 3: Animal Pal Review (5 minutes)

Share the DAY 2 ANIMAL PAL POSTER to summarize the teaching of the day. Pass out the Wonder Junction Maps and Junior stickers to each person and have them put on today's animal pal.

What kind of animal is our animal pal today? Wolf pup. And what's our wolf pup's name? Junior. Junior is a nickname we sometimes give to a kid. Why do you think our wolf pup is named Junior? Junior is not a grown up yet. He reminds us there was a time when Jesus was a child. Do you see Junior's dad in the picture? What does it look like they're doing together? Howling at the moon. Wolf fathers teach their young pups lots of things, just like Jesus' dad would have taught him lots of things about carpentry and about God. What can you tell me about Jesus' childhood? Answers will vary.

★ Gospel Opportunity: You can talk about our need for God (Jesus). Becoming one of his children is the first step to loving, adoring, and obeying him.



DEVOTION 3: WORSHIP JESUS

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. John 1:1

Imagine meeting a man who claimed to be God. What would you think? Crazy nut?

Now imagine this man claimed to be the fulfillment of statements written hundreds of years before. Sure, sure, weirdo.

Now imagine if the little boy down the street, who had died, was running around again. The man who claimed to be God had raised him from the dead. It was no trick—you had seen the boy after he died, and he was now playing with your kids.

Makes you think, doesn't it? Could this man really be who he claimed to be? This is our Savior.

Even though today, we would (and should) scoff at someone staking a claim to deity, Jesus Christ was the real deal. He was the Creator incarnate, the God-man, the one who came to save his people from their sins, fulfilling the promises God had made since the beginning of time.

As you study your Bible this week, put aside the genteel storybook notions that cloud the truth about the Messiah. And read the gospel accounts as if for the first time. Marvel at the astounding claims Jesus made like, "before Abraham was, I AM"; the awesome demonstrations of his power over nature, sin, and death; the amazing fact that

he rose from the dead; and the astonishing change in the lives of those he touched.

Of all the people who have ever lived, ever led a religion, ever claimed to be a deity, only Jesus has the credentials to deserve our worship and following. And the only way we can know the truth about him is through his inspired Word, the Bible.

As you prepare to meet Jesus with your students today, let's meditate on this Puritan prayer about the Rock of Ages.

Thou Great I AM,

Fill my mind with elevation and grandeur at the thought of a Being

With whom one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day.

A mighty God who, amidst the lapse of the worlds, and the revolutions of empires,

Feels no variableness but is glorious in immortality. May I rejoice that, while men die, the Lord lives;

That, while all creatures are broken reeds, empty cisterns, fading flowers, withering grass,

He is the Rock of Ages, the fountain of Living Waters.

—Arthur Bennett, *The Valley of Vision* (The Banner of Truth Trust, 2005), 104.

EXPLORATION STATIONS

Discovery Center: Power over Sickness/Sight

MATERIALS

- ☐ Bandanas (for blindfolds)
- ☐ Pillowcase or burlap sack filled with safe items to feel (e.g., hairbrush, spoon, doll, plastic cup, toothbrush, marker, pacifier)

PREP

Put the items in the sack. If you have lots of kids, you may want to make more than one sack.

DIRECTIONS

Take turns putting on the blindfold, pulling an object out, and trying to guess what it is. Talk about how awesome it is to have eyes that can see each item (but be sensitive if anyone can't see).

TEACHING TIE-IN

Jesus has amazing power! He has all power, so he can make sick people well and give sight to people who can't see! In the Bible, we read about Jesus healing blind people with his incredible power. Jesus is God the Son!

Wet Touch Table: Power over Nature

MATERIALS

- Wet touch table materials
- ☐ Toy boats
- ☐ Play plastic people

PREP

Put the toy boats and plastic people in the water.

DIRECTIONS

Play with the people and boats. Have the children reenact the Bible account of Jesus calming the storm by making waves in the water (Mark 4:35–41). Then have them stop at the appropriate time.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Jesus has amazing power! He has all power so even the wind and sea and all of nature listens to him. One time, he told a storm to be still and it stopped! Nobody else can do that. Only Jesus! He is God the Son!

Dry Touch Table: Power over Death

MATERIALS

- ☐ Touch table with tarp underneath
- ☐ Play sand or soil
- ☐ Play plastic people
- ☐ Play plastic shovels

PREP

Put the sand or soil in the table, and "bury" the plastic people.

DIRECTIONS

Find and "unbury" the people.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Jesus has amazing power! He has power over death. In the Bible, we read about a few times when he brought dead people back to life. He even brought himself back to life! Nobody else can do that. Only Jesus! He is God the Son!

Dramatic Play: Old West Dress-Up

MATERIALS

- ☐ Materials from previous days
- ☐ Play doctor kit or stethoscope

PREP

Use materials from previous days. Add in doctor kit items.

DIRECTIONS

Dress up and pretend to be doctors helping sick patients in the Old West.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Life in the Old West was hard. A lot of people never even made it to the West because they got sick and died along the way. Can you imagine if Jesus had been traveling with them? While he was on earth, he healed people just by speaking. Now that's power! No one else can do that. Only Jesus! He is God the Son!

Coloring Corner: John 21:25

See directions for Day 1, but use the Day 3 Memory Verse Coloring Sheet.

INTRODUCE IT!

Wonder Junction General Store (5 minutes)

Prep: Bookmark all the Scripture verses used in today's lesson.

Teacher 1: Welcome back, partners! Come on in and sit for a spell. I've got a question for you. What do you want to be when you grow up? Take a few responses.

Teacher 2: Now here's another question. If you lived in the Old West, what do you think you would have wanted to be when you were grown up? I'll give you some choices, and you move to the spot that fits your answers as I point to it. Point as you say them—one in each corner of the room. Say them twice at least. The choices are: cowboy or cowgirl, Pony Express rider, general store owner, or gold miner. Okay, move to your spot! Do so, then have kids sit back down.

Teacher 1: Well, you know, the owner of the general store is the one that has everything you might need. Wonder Junction's general store owner is Mr. Percy Jones. Good ol' Percy. He's always ready to help ya out. Show the general store on the WONDER JUNCTION POSTER. If yer sick, he has medicine. If you need food, he has flour, sugar, and other stuff for making pancakes, and chili, and yummy food. If you need clothes, he has sewing supplies. But as helpful as all that can be, it's nothing compared to all the ways Jesus was able to care for people while he was on earth. Whatever you needed, he could supply it!

Teacher 2: Yes, he can supply it! Which leads to this here wonder-filled thought: Nothin' is too hard for Jesus! And I mean nothin'! Now that's a wonder!

Teacher 1: It sure is! He's the Almighty, which means he has all power! Let's check out four different ways he showed his wonder-working power to people while he lived here on earth.

TEACH JT!

Part 1: Wonder-Working Power! (10 minutes)

Prep: Cover each section of the **WONDER-WORKING POWER POSTER** with sheets of copy paper. Get the other supplies ready, including dampening a paper towel for each child or for just one person who will demo it up front.

Four accounts follow, illustrating four categories of wonder-working power that demonstrate lesus is God. Do as many as time allows.

Teacher 1: When Jesus was about 30 years old, he chose some men to be his students. He taught them amazing truths, and they were filled with wonder at who Jesus was.

Teacher 2: One of those amazing truths is that Jesus said he is God. Listen to this! Read or paraphrase John 8:58–59. Jesus was saying that he is the "great I AM," which is a title God used for himself. So Jesus was claiming to be God!

Teacher 1: Now, if you or I claimed to be God, people would think we were crazy. But Jesus *showed* he is God by doing miracles that only God can do. Let's take a look at a few of those miracles that show Jesus is who he claimed to be—God the Son.

- 1. Wonder-Working Power 1—Power over Sickness and Disease (Mark 1:29–31): Either have one person demo it or give each child a towel to lie on and (optional) a damp paper towel "cloth." Have them lie down as if they're sick. Ask if they've ever had a fever. Discuss what it would be like if their mom came along and said, "Fever, go away right now!" Would it go away? Then read or paraphrase Mark 1:29–31, uncovering the WONDER-WORKING POWER POSTER: SICKNESS, and have them get up and start serving you at the appropriate time. Jesus has power to heal sickness and disease, which is a wonder! Nobody else has power over sickness and disease! Only Jesus—he is God the Son!
- 2. Wonder-Working Power 2—Power over Nature (Mark 4:35–39): Have the kids sit close together as if in a boat. Turn the lights off, and flash the flashlights on and off for lightning,

bang a pan for thunder, lightly spray mist for waves crashing, and have them gently blow to simulate the wind blowing. Tell the Bible account, uncovering the WONDER-WORKING POWER POSTER: NATURE, having them make a fierce storm at the appropriate time. Continue and have them get completely still at the right time. Jesus has power over nature, which is a wonder! Nobody else has power over nature! Only Jesus—he is God the Son!

- 3. Wonder-Working Power 3—Power over Sin (Mark 2:1–12): Have the kids use their towels again. Explain what it means to be paralyzed and have them lie down, trying not to move at all. Tell the Bible account, uncovering the WONDER-WORKING POWER POSTER: SIN, and have them pick up their "mats" and walk at the appropriate time. Sin is disobeying God's commands—such as lying or being unkind. Jesus forgave the man of his sins. What a wonder to be able to forgive sins! Nobody else has power to do that. Only Jesus—he is God the Son!
- 4. Wonder-Working Power 4—Power over Death (Mark 5:21–24, 35–42): Using one towel, have a teacher/adult lie down and be still, as if she had died. (You can make this a fun challenge by seeing just how still she can be!) Have everyone else gather around and act as if they're sad. Tell the Bible account, uncovering the WONDER-WORKING POWER POSTER: DEATH, having the teacher/adult rise at the appropriate time. Discuss how Jesus has power over death. This is a wonder! Nobody else has power over death! He even had power over his own death. Jesus died and then came back to life. What a wonder that is!

Teacher 2: As you can see, Jesus' power is different than anyone else's power. Is there any other king as powerful as Jesus? No! Move behind the puppet stage while Teacher 1 finishes.

Teacher 1: Other leaders have lived, died . . . and stayed dead! They couldn't bring themselves back to life. Only Jesus! He's a wonder! We'll hear more about that tomorrow.

This is a good transitional time to sing one of the songs found at the end of this lesson.

Part 2: Puppet Pal—All the Books in the World (5 minutes)

Prep: Tape one **PUPPET SCRIPT** inside the puppet stage and attach the other to a clipboard for reference. Tape the little book to the puppet's hand.

Teacher: Kids, help me call for Samuel (Samantha). On the count of 3, let's yell, "Sam!" Ready? 1, 2, 3—Sam? Hello? Are you in there? Hello?

Puppet: Come up holding a little book. Oh, hey, everyone!

Teacher: Sam, where'd you get your book?

Puppet: Oh, it's from the library. It's about the Old West. Did you know the Old West was also called the Wild West? That's because, well, it was wild out there.

Teacher: I didn't know that.

Puppet: Or that there were a lot of cowboys in the Old West? Most of them were young guys who worked on ranches and rode horses. That would have been cool to have your own horse!

Teacher: Yes, it would.

Puppet: When I finish this one, I'm going to go back for more. There's a whole row of books about the Old West. Mention a couple titles: Rowdy Rachel's Lasso Tricks; The Adventures of Mustang the Horse; Cookin' for Cowboys.

Teacher: Well, now you've got me wonderin'. How many books do you think are in that library?

Puppet: In the whole library? I don't know—10?

Teacher: I bet it's at least 40,000. **Puppet:** That's sooo many books!

Teacher: And I wonder how many libraries there are in the world.

Puppet: 100?

Teacher: Way more!

Puppet: 1,000?

Teacher: Not even close. It's going on half a million!

Puppet: That's crazy!

Teacher: Yeah, and you know what else? The Bible tells us that Jesus did so many amazing things that the world couldn't even hold all the books that would be written about them!

Puppet: We just talked about him having power to calm the storm, and heal sick people, and raise people from the dead.

Teacher: That's just a drop in the bucket of all the wonder-filled things he did. He walked on water . . .

Puppet: Walked on water, did you say? That's impossible!

Teacher: Not for God! And he fed 5,000 men plus women and children with only two fish and five little loaves of bread.

Puppet: That doesn't even sound like enough for my little family and especially not thousands of people.

Teacher: Yeah, and the amazing thing is, there were even lots of leftovers! More than what he started with!

Puppet: Wow!

Teacher: He did so many wondrous things, we can't count them all.

Puppet: Nothing is too hard for God!

Teacher: That's right, Sam. Nobody else can do these things. Only Jesus because he's God. He's a wonder!

Puppet: He's mighty!

Teacher: He is! The Bible even calls him the Almighty! We should be completely amazed by him!

Puppet: I'm going to go lie down on my back outside and look up at the clouds. They always remind me of how mighty God is.

Teacher: Great idea! I'll join you in a bit, but bye for now.

Part 3: Animal Pal Review (5 minutes)

Share the DAY 3 ANIMAL PAL POSTER to summarize the teaching of the day. Pass out the Wonder Junction Maps and Mighty stickers and have the kids add today's animal pal.

What kind of animal is our animal pal today? A bison. And what's our bison's name? Mighty. Why do you think our bison is named Mighty? Bison are powerful, mighty animals. Jesus is the most powerful, mighty person who ever has lived or ever will live. He is called the Almighty. He is the Son of God, and nothing is too hard for God. How did Jesus use his mighty power to help people? Answers will vary.

Continue reviewing with the following questions. Be sure to give the correct answer for any "no" questions. If the answer is yes, have the kids run in place fast. (Bison can run faster than horses!) If it is no, have them say "moo." (Bison are from the same animal kind as cows.)

- 1. Yes or no: Jesus had trouble healing people. No—moo. Because he is God, he has all power to heal just by speaking or touching someone.
- 2. Yes or no: Storms obeyed Jesus and got quiet. Yes—run in place fast. Think about how amazing that is!
- **3. Yes or no:** If Jesus told someone who had died to get up, they would stay dead. No—moo. Jesus raised people from the dead!
- 4. Jesus has the power to forgive people of their sins. Yes—run in place fast.

DEVOTION 4: BELIEVE JESUS

He is not here, for he has risen, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Matthew 28:6

Imagine following the political career of a most unusual man for several years. He was said to be the one for whom the people had waited. The one who would save the people from the persecution suffered for hundreds of years.

He was certainly different than anyone who had come before. He taught with such authority and knew the holy Scriptures so thoroughly, it was no wonder many were attracted to him. His power was undeniable—he had healed your friend from a bleeding problem that no doctor had been able to help with and had made the evil spirits tormenting you go away.

One of the more significant differences was his lifestyle—he seemed to live a blameless life. Even his mother, a friend of yours, claimed he was an obedient child who cared for others. It was difficult to imagine any man as the personification of perfection, but if there was one, he would be it.

Imagine your grief and despair when he died and especially at the way in which he died—a horrible death reserved for the worst of criminals. Indeed, he was hung on a tree between two thieves. The strange thing about this man was that he had seemed to hint that his death was near. But why? Why would the one God sent need to die? Didn't he come to bring life and freedom?

Now imagine that heart-stopping moment when you went to honor his memory and the man at the tomb said, "He is not here; for he has risen, as he said." Imagine the momentary panic at the missing body. Rise again . . . did he say he would rise from the dead? His body isn't there . . . is it possible he's really alive? He's alive! Imagine seeing the risen Savior.

As you study the chapters pertaining to Christ's death and resurrection, meditate on the gravity of what our sin brought about—the death of the Creator of the universe. And rejoice in his resurrection that secured eternal life for you!

As you share with the children today, make sure they know that the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is anchored in history. He really died, and he really rose again. And he was seen by hundreds of witnesses after his resurrection. Make sure they know that they can receive the eternal life he offers to those who believe.

May we pray as the Puritans did:

Blessed Lord Jesus,

Before thy cross I kneel and see the heinousness of my sin, my iniquity that caused thee to be "made a curse," the evil that excited the severity of divine wrath.

Show me the enormity of my guilt by the crown of thorns, the pierced hands and feet, the bruised body, the dying cries.

Thy blood is the blood of incarnate God, its worth infinite, its value beyond all thought.

Infinite must be the evil and guilt that demands such a price.

Yet thy compassions yearn over me, thy heart hastens to my rescue, thy love endured my curse, thy mercy bore my deserved stripes.

Let me walk humbly in the lowest depths of humiliation, bathed in thy blood, triumphing gloriously as an heir of salvation.

EXPLORATION STATIONS

Discovery Center: Lacing Card Crosses

MATERIALS

- Cross Pattern
- Corrugated cardboard
- ☐ Hole punch and scissors
- ☐ Shoelaces, yarn, or ribbon, 30-inch pieces
- □ Tape

PREP

Trace the CROSS PATTERN onto corrugated cardboard and cut out as many as needed. Hole punch where indicated. If using yarn or ribbon, tape the threading end to make it easier to lace through the holes. Tape the other end to the back of the cross.

DIRECTIONS

Lace in and out on the crosses with the shoelaces, yarn, or ribbon.

TEACHING TIE-IN

What shape is this? Take responses. What does it have to do with Jesus? Take responses. Isn't it a wonder that Jesus didn't stay dead? He came back to life and is alive now! Jesus is the Son of God!

Wet Touch Table: Easter Eggs

MATERIALS

- ☐ Touch table with tarp underneath
- Water
- □ Plastic Easter eggs
- ☐ Fun foam or rubber crosses that fit in the eggs
- □ Tongs
- □ Baskets

PREP

Partially fill the touch table with water. Place the crosses in the eggs and put the eggs in the water.

DIRECTIONS

Use tongs to retrieve the eggs out of the water. Open them up to find the crosses. Put them in the baskets.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Let's see what we can find in the Easter eggs. Do so. What does Easter have to do with crosses? Discuss that we remember Jesus' sacrifice on the cross for sin at Easter. Jesus went through great pain and sadness when he was on the cross. That is amazing, that God feels pain! Why did he do it? Because he loves you. That's amazing! It's also amazing that Jesus came back to life. He was completely dead—he didn't just go to sleep or faint. He died and came back to life! What a wonder!

Dry Touch Table: Snakes in the Sand

MATERIALS

- ☐ Touch table and tarp underneath
- ☐ Sand or soil (whatever you used yesterday)
- ☐ Play rubber snakes
- ☐ Play shovels and pails

PREP

Put the snakes in the sand or soil.

DIRECTIONS

Play with the items.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Out West, there are snakes called rattlesnakes. They're called that because their tails rattle. There are other kinds of snakes in other parts of the world. God created snakes with the other animals in the beginning. In fact, the first woman, Eve, met a snake in the garden of Eden. But Satan used the snake to trick Eve. Then Adam and Eve disobeyed God, and that's called sin. We all sin. That's why we need Jesus!

Dramatic Play: Old West Dress-Up

MATERIALS

- ☐ Materials from previous days
- ☐ Play gold coins or gold/yellow Easter eggs
- ☐ Pillowcases or small burlap bags

PREP

Use previous materials. Add the gold items, spreading them around, partially hiding them. Add the pillow-cases or bags.

DIRECTIONS

Dress up and pretend to be gold miners by collecting the hidden "gold" in the pillowcases or bags.

TEACHING TIE-IN

Wouldn't it be great if somebody gave you a bag of gold as a gift? Well, I know an even better gift. Jesus wants to give you the gift of living forever! Discuss the gospel here.

Coloring Corner: John 20:31

INTRODUCE IT!

Wonder Junction Gold Mine (5 minutes)

Prep: Bookmark all the Scripture verses used in today's lesson.

Teacher 1: Welcome back, partners. It's good to see you again at Wonder Junction! You know, Wonder Junction is a mighty special place, with the train depot, the bank, the school, and of course, this church! I'm so glad we get to learn more about Jesus here at High Point Chapel.

Teacher 2: Hey, have any of you hiked out to the old gold mine? Take responses. It's way over yonder. Show the gold mine on the WONDER JUNCTION POSTER. That was quite the exciting place a while back when people were finding gold there. That is until Carson got stuck down in the mine.

Teacher 1: Oh, I remember that. It was a beautiful, sunny day up above, but down in the mine, it was dark. Carson went into the mine, lit his lamp, and started digging for gold. Suddenly, there was a cave-in with big rocks falling down all around. Carson was stuck! In fact, he was stuck down there for three days in a cold, dark space—all by himself—while he waited for someone to rescue him.

Teacher 2: Thankfully, Fearless Abner volunteered to make the dangerous trip down into the mine to find Carson and rescue him. Do you think Fearless Abner found him and got him out of there? Woo-whee, you bet he did! And you better believe there was a lot of celebrating that night! The whole town came out. Carson was lost and in trouble, but then he was found! What a rescue!

Teacher 1: Today, we want to tell you about another rescue mission. We've got some gold nuggets hidden around to help us do that. This rescue mission has to do with Jesus. He's our *Savior* because he can *save* us from sin. The Bible says so right here. Point to Matthew 27–28 in your open Bible.

Teacher 2: We've already talked about how he came to earth as a baby, grew into a man, and lived a perfect, wonder-filled life. Now let's here more about his rescue mission.

TEACH JT!

Part 1: Truth Hunt Gospel Presentation (10 minutes)

Prep: Cut apart the NUGGETS OF TRUTH POSTERS and ADMIT, BELIEVE, FOREVER RECEIVE POSTERS. Gather gold plastic eggs ("nuggets"). Bigger eggs are better. Gather the visual clues or use pictures or stickers. Put one visual clue in each egg and number the eggs from 1–8 with a permanent marker. The eighth egg should be empty (no visual clue) to represent the empty tomb. The ninth will be held up just as a sample. Hide the "nuggets" so they are still partially visible. After you use them in this lesson, gather them and quickly re-hide them before the next group comes in.

Teacher 1: We're going to look for some gold in these here parts. You're searching for something that looks like this, which we're calling our gold nuggets. Hold up the extra egg. If you find a gold nugget, bring it to me (just one), then sit back down. Don't open it. Ready? Go! Do so.

Nugget 1: Garden

Teacher 2: Let's open up nugget 1. Hold up the leaf. Jesus has always existed, even before time. He didn't have a beginning. But he created time, and he created the world and everything in it. He placed animals and people and plants in a beautiful, perfect garden called Eden. So why do you think there's a leaf in there? Take responses. It reminds us of a garden. Show the GARDEN POSTER.

Teacher 1: Jesus is beautiful and perfect, and everything he does is good, so his creation was very good. Do you know the names of the first two people God made? Pause for responses. Adam and Eve. God gave them a perfect world to live in and everything they needed.



Nugget 2: Snake

Teacher 1: What comes after 1? Pause for responses. Right, 2! Let's jump up and down and count to 2, then we'll open up nugget 2. Jump and then open the nugget and show the snake.

Teacher 2: Satan took the form of a snake in the garden. Let's hiss like a snake. Pause. He tempted Eve, trying to get her to eat some fruit that God said not to eat. Eve listened to the snake and ate the fruit. Show the SNAKE POSTER. Then Adam disobeyed God and ate some too. Because they sinned, God placed a curse on his creation, and it was no longer very good. Let's make a motion like the world broke. Do so, acting like you're breaking a stick.

Teacher 1: Do you know what sin is? Sin is when we don't obey God. Sometimes we don't obey, right? Well, this is where that started. Adam and Eve didn't obey God, and the perfect world wasn't perfect anymore. Now we have bad things, like sickness and sadness.

Nugget 3: Waiting

Teacher 2: What comes after number 2? Pause for responses. Correct, 3! Let's jump up and down and count to 3, then we'll open nugget 3. Jump and then open the nugget and show the game sand timer (hourglass).

Teacher 1: What's this? Pause for responses. It's called an hourglass. It's kind of like a watch or a timer. After Adam sinned, he and Eve had children and grandchildren. And each person was born a sinner. God told them he would send someone to save them from the mess the world was in. Show the HOURGLASS POSTER. This hourglass reminds us of time passing while people waited and waited for the Savior to come.

Nugget 4: Baby in a Manger

Teacher 2: What comes after 3? Pause for responses. Yes, 4! Let's jump up and down and count to 4, then we'll open up nugget 4. Jump and then open the nugget and show the little baby item.

Teacher 1: Well, after waiting for a long, long time, the Savior came! He is Jesus! Let's cheer! Do so. Now God was with us—Immanuel! But he didn't come as a grown-up. He came as a baby! Show the BABY IN A MANGER POSTER. What a wonder that was! Remember his special birth? Remember the angels, the wise men, and the special star? Jesus' birth was a wonder.

Nugget 5: Hammer

Teacher 2: What comes after 4? Pause for responses. Right, 5! Let's jump up and down and count to 5, then we'll open up nugget 5. Jump and then open the nugget and show the little hammer.

Teacher 1: Jesus' dad was a carpenter. Jesus grew up like you did and learned things, like carpentry. Show the HAMMER POSTER. But he also wasn't like you because he was completely God and completely man at the same time. And he is perfect. What a wonder!

Nugget 6: Calmed the Sea

Teacher 2: What comes after 5? Pause for responses. Correct, 6! Let's jump up and down and count to 6, then we'll open up nugget 6. Jump and then open the nugget and show them the tiny boat.

Teacher 1: Jesus grew up and began teaching people that he is God. He did many awesome miracles, like calming the sea. Show the CALMING THE SEA POSTER. Can you imagine if you were in the boat with Jesus? He told the storm to stop, and it did! What a wonder!











Nugget 7: Cross

Teacher 2: What comes after 6? Pause for responses. Yes, 7! Let's jump up and down and count to 7, then we'll open up nugget 7. Jump and then open the nugget and hold up the small cross.

Teacher 1: Even though Jesus lived a perfect life, some men put him on a cross to die. He said he is God, and they didn't like that. Wow! Jesus—who is God—allowed them to put him on a cross. Show the CROSS POSTER. It's a wonder he chose to do it! He could've called 10,000 angels to come if he wanted to. But he didn't. He died to take our punishment for the wrong things we do.

Teacher 2: The Bible tells us that the punishment for our sin is death. When we die, we are separated away from God forever in a terrible place called hell. Remember we said each of us sins?

Teacher 1: God tells children to obey their parents (Ephesians 6:1). Have you ever not obeyed your mom when she asked you to clean your room? Have you ever thrown a fit? God says we are to be kind (Ephesians 4:32). Have you ever be unkind to someone? Just one sin is enough to separate you forever from God!

Teacher 2: That's because God is holy, which means he's perfect and doesn't sin. He can't allow sinners into heaven because heaven is perfect.

Teacher 1: But God loves us so much, and he had a rescue plan to save us. That plan was sending Jesus to save us. That's why Jesus came!

Teacher 2: You aren't automatically saved and going to live with God someday. You need to be part of God's family for that to happen. If you really do want to be part of God's family and belong to God, then you can!

Teacher 1: If you don't like your sin and want to be part of God's family, you need to admit to God that you sin—tell him you know that you don't obey all the time—and tell him you're sorry for it (repent). Show the ADMIT POSTER.

Teacher 2: Then you must believe what the Bible says, that Jesus died on the cross to pay the punishment for your sin. But then, he rose from the dead. This shows us that God was pleased with his payment. Show the BELIEVE POSTER.

Teacher 1: And finally, you need to forever receive Jesus by asking him to forgive you and make you part of his family. Show the FOREVER RECEIVE POSTER. It's an amazing gift to be part of God's family and to live with him in heaven someday.

Nugget 8: Empty Tomb

Teacher 2: What comes after 7? Pause for responses. Right, 8! Move behind the puppet set while Teacher 1 finishes out this section.

Teacher 1: Let's jump up and down and count to 8, then we'll open up nugget 8. Do so, recognizing that it's empty. Now here's something incredible to hear! Jesus had been completely dead. He didn't just faint or fall asleep. He . . . was . . . dead. But, wonder of wonders, he came back to life! Show the EMPTY TOMB POSTER. Jesus is alive and can be our Savior forever. Let's gather up our gold nuggets and then talk more about this with Sam.

This can be a good transitional time to sing one of the songs found at the end of this lesson.

Part 2: Puppet Pal—Wild West Bad Guys (5 minutes)

Prep: Tape one **PUPPET SCRIPT** inside the puppet stage and attach the other to a clipboard for reference.

Teacher: Boys and girls, help me call for Sam. Do so.

Puppet: Come up pretending you're riding a horse.

Teacher: Hey, Sam, what are you doing?

Puppet: I'm pretending to ride my horse and catch a bad guy.

Teacher: What bad guy?

Puppet: There were some bad guys who really lived in the Old West.

Teacher: Tell me more . . .

Puppet: One was named Billy the Kid. He started out stealing some laundry. He had to go to

jail for that.

Teacher: God says not to steal.

Puppet: I know. But when he got out of jail, he kept stealing stuff, and he even killed some people and robbed some banks and trains.

Teacher: Whoa, God says not to kill.

Puppet: Right! And there were other bad guys, too, like Jesse James and Butch Cassidy. They robbed banks and killed people too.

Teacher: I've heard of them. Show the WILD WEST BAD GUYS POSTER and point out each one. That sure is *sad* to be sooo *bad* like those guys. But you know what?

Puppet: What?

Teacher: All of us have the same problem Billy the Kid and Jesse James and Butch Cassidy had. They were sinners, and so are we.

Puppet: Act shocked. But I don't go around robbing banks and killing people!

Teacher: Thankfully, you don't! But the Bible tells us all of us sin. Some, like these bad guys, sin by robbing and killing. We may sin by telling a lie or not being kind. The Bible says nobody is born good—not even one of us (Romans 3:23). Only God is good. Kids, can you think of a time you have sinned? Take responses.

Puppet: I didn't know everyone sins.

Teacher: Yep! That's why we need Jesus to save us! And he will if we ask to be in his family.

Puppet: That's the Admit, Believe, Forever Receive we just talked about, right?

Teacher: Show the ADMIT, BELIEVE, FOREVER RECEIVE POSTERS again during this paragraph. Right! Admit you sin, believe in Jesus, and forever receive him. This makes you his child. You'll still be your parents' child. But this means you'll have God as your heavenly Father, and you'll be part of his family.

Puppet: I hope the kids believe in Jesus and want to be his child!

Teacher: I do too. Turn to the kids. If you want to be a child of God, make sure you talk to your leader or parents or me today.

Puppet: Admit you sin, believe in Jesus, and forever receive him. That's the most important nugget of truth ever.

Teacher: It sure is! Well, bye for now, Sam! See you tomorrow!


Part 3: Animal Pal Review (5 minutes)

Share the DAY 4 ANIMAL PAL POSTER to summarize the teaching of the day. Pass out the Wonder Junction Maps and Champ stickers and have the kids add today's animal pal.

What kind of animal is our animal pal today? A grizzly bear. And what's our grizzly bear's name? Champ. Champ stands for the word *champion*. Why do you think our bear is named Champ? Champ is a champion. He's the king of the forest. During cold months, he sleeps in a cave, and in the spring, he wakes up and comes out. Jesus is a champion. He died and was put in a tomb (like a cave), but he was not just asleep like Champ. He was dead and came back to life. Nobody else can do that—only Jesus! He's the ultimate champion. He is the Son of God. What can you tell me about Jesus' death and resurrection? Answers will vary. How can we be part of his family? Admit, believe, forever receive.

Continue reviewing with the following questions. Be sure to give the correct answer for any "no" questions. Have the kids put their arms up and act big like a bear if the answer is yes and pretend to sleep if it is no.



DEVOTION 5: SHARE JESUS

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth. Acts 1:8

Imagine being part of the crowd chanting for the death of the one standing before the governor. You weren't sure what he had done wrong, but the religious leaders were calling for his death, so he must have been deserving of it.

You followed the crowd as they surged toward the place of the skull, where the crucifixions took place, taunting the man all the way.

Imagine watching as the man was lifted up and drew his last breath. If he was who he claimed to be, surely he could have saved himself.

Imagine, months later, carrying your friend, lame from birth, to the temple gates as you had hundreds of times before and entering into the temple to pray. Imagine your disbelief as, moments later, the man you knew was unable to walk, ran into the place of prayer. What happened to him? Who were these men he was following around?

Wait—was that the fisherman who was a student of the man they crucified several months ago? One of the ones who had deserted the Teacher at his arrest? Hadn't the Teacher's followers gone into hiding after his death?

Imagine your shock as the fisherman boldly accused you of murdering the . . . Prince of Life? Who had risen from the dead? And been seen by the fisherman? That man was alive, and in his name, your friend was healed?

Imagine the hope as the fisherman called the entire crowd to repent of their sins and receive the sacrifice the Prince of Life had made on behalf of sinners. Surely, the one who had given the fisherman the power to preach, who had healed your friend, who had raised himself

from the dead—surely, he was the one about whom the prophets had preached and for whom you had waited.

The Redeemer had come? The Redeemer had come!
And he would be coming again some day!

Think about what happened after Jesus rose from the dead and marvel at the transformation that took place in the lives of those who believed in the Son of God. The amazing power of God to transform sinners into the image of the invisible Christ is evident throughout the rest of the New Testament—and should be evident in our lives as children of God.

As you share with your students today, emphasize that it is God who saves us and calls us to be his witnesses. We have a precious treasure—the gift of eternal life through faith in Jesus—that we must share with those around us while we wait for his return.

May we pray as the Puritans did:

Father of Jesus,

May my words and works allure others to the highest walks of faith and love!

May worldlings be won to delight in acquaintance with thee!

May the timid and irresolute be warned of coming doom by my zeal for Jesus!

Cause me to be a mirror of thy grace; to show others the joy of thy service,

Help me to walk as Jesus walked, my only Savior and perfect model, his mind my inward guest, his meekness my covering garb.

Discovery Center: Double It!

MATERIALS

PREP

Gather the supplies.

DIRECTIONS

Kids play with the money. They can even pretend it's a bank. At some point, give them a certain amount of money and see if they can figure out how to double it. For instance, count out two coins and ask them to double it with two more. Now how many do they have?

TEACHING TIE-IN

Jesus, who will forever be God and man, is in heaven right now. While we wait for him to come back, we can love others, care for them, be kind, and tell them about Jesus. That's our mission!

Touch Table Dry: Coming in the Clouds

MATERIALS

- ☐ Touch table with tarp underneath
- ☐ Tons of cotton balls
- ☐ One figure or picture to represent Jesus
- Optional: assorted tongs, spoons, scoops, buckets, baskets

PREP

INTRODUCE IT!

Wonder Junction Bank (5 minutes)

Prep: Bookmark all the Scripture verses used in today's lesson.

Teacher 1: Well, here we are, partners, on our last day at Wonder Junction. It sure has been a mighty fine time, hasn't it? Yesterday, we were looking for gold nuggets. Anyone remember what were in any of those gold nuggets? Take responses for a minute as review, and then move on. You may want to show the nuggets again.

Teacher 2: Those gold nuggets came from the gold mine. And when miners found gold, guess where they took it to keep it safe? To the bank, of course. Mr. Daly, the banker, counts it out and puts it in the big safe so no one can steal it. Show them the bank on the **WONDER JUNCTION POSTER**.

Teacher 1: Finding gold is one way to make money out West. But there are other ways too! Some people run the store, or do laundry, or own a train! People use their talents well and make more money than when they started.

Teacher 2: Today, we'll be talking about how to wisely use the talents God has given us as we wait for Jesus to come back.

Teacher 1: Because guess what? Jesus is going to come back! Did you know that? He came the first time as a baby, but when he grew up, he died to save sinners. Then he came back to life and went up to heaven.

Teacher 2: He'll come again as the King of kings. Let's talk more about what happened after Jesus died and rose again.

TEACH IT!

Part 1: Jesus' Return and the Parable of the Talents (5-10 minutes)

Prep: Gather the items listed. Fold the **JESUS RETURNING POSTER** in half to show one side at a time. Optional: make Bible-time costumes for the action figures.

Teacher 1: The Bible tells us after Jesus rose from the dead, he showed himself to some people for a number of days (Acts 1:1-11). And then guess what happened? He went back up to heaven in a cloud! Show the first scene in the JESUS RETURNING POSTER. Let's say, "Whoosh!" Do so.

Teacher 2: That's where Jesus is now. He is still fully God and fully man in heaven—forever. Jesus is getting things ready for his children to live with him someday. Then, at some point, Jesus will come back down to earth. We don't know when, but we do know how.

Teacher 1: He'll come back down just like he went up—in a cloud (Matthew 24:27, 30). Let's stand up (Jesus went up!) and then sit back down (and he'll come back down). Do so, and point to the second scene in the JESUS RETURNING POSTER. What a wonder that will be! The Bible says it will be like lightning—fast and bright. And it will happen, because Jesus promised he will return, and he always keeps his promises.

Teacher 2: While we're waiting for him to come back, what should we do? Well, let's see what the Bible says we should do. We're going to need some action figures to help us out. Place the figures on a table and have the kids circle around.

Teacher 1: In Matthew 25, Jesus tells a story (called a parable) about a man who is going on a journey and leaving his servants in charge of his stuff. Before he leaves, he calls his servants together. We'll pretend this is the man who's leaving, and these are his servants. Hold up the man, then the three servants, one at a time—Servant 1, Servant 2, and

Teacher 2: He gives one servant five coins. Let's count to five as I give him five coins. Do so, with them counting, as you put five coins in a pile. He gives another servant two coins. Let's count to two. Do so, with them counting as you put two in a pile. And he gives the

other servant one coin. Let's count to one as I give him one coin. Do so. Each servant should end up with his own pile.

Teacher 1: Then the man goes away. Let's say bye to the man as he leaves on his journey. They say bye as you walk the man out of sight.

Teacher 2: While he's gone, Servant 1 gets busy. Make Servant 1 look busy. He works hard and gets five more coins. Let's count out five more. Have them count as you put five more coins in his pile.

Teacher 1: Same with Servant 2. He gets busy (do so with Servant 2) and gets two more coins. Let's count out two more. Have them count as you put two more coins in his pile.

Teacher 2: What do you think happens with Servant 3? Do you think he works hard like the others and gets one more coin? Pause for responses.

Teacher 1: Actually, he digs in the ground and hides his master's money. Pretend to do so with Servant 3. He doesn't work hard to double it.

Teacher 2: Now, after a long time, the master comes back. Here he comes! Let's say hi! They say hi as you walk the master back into the scene.

Teacher 1: He calls Servant 1 (walk him in), and Servant 1 tells him he was given five coins, and he has made five more. The master says, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" Let's say that together. Do so.

Teacher 2: Next, the master calls Servant 2 (walk him in), and Servant 2 tells him he was given two coins, and he has made two more. The master says, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" Let's say that together again. Do so.

Teacher 1: Finally, Servant 3 comes to the master (walk him in) and tells him he was given one coin, which he buried. Do you think the master was happy about that? Pause for responses.

Teacher 2: No! The master tells him he should have put it in the bank where it could have made a little more money. Move behind the puppet set while Teacher 1 finishes.

Teacher 1: The master takes the one coin from him and gives it to Servant 1. Take the coin and put it in Servant 1's pile. Hmmm . . . what do you think of that? Let's talk to Sam to hear a little more about what this story means for us.

Part 2: Puppet Pal—On a Mission (5 minutes)

Prep: Make a mini gold miner's pan, using either a mini tart pan or foil. Or buy a mini pie and use the foil pan from it. Attach it to the puppet's hand.

Teacher: Let's call for Sam. Do so, and have Sam come up. Hey, what are you up to, Sam?

Puppet: I'm on a mission.

Teacher: What kind of mission?

Puppet: Well, the other day, I was going to dig for gold, but it didn't work out, so today I decided to pan for gold instead.

Teacher: Have you ever found any gold nuggets?

Puppet: Yes! I have three from my last try at panning for gold. I'm hoping with some hard work, I can find three more.

Teacher: That sounds like the story Jesus told in the Bible. A master left his servants with some coins. Two of the servants used their time wisely and earned more, but one servant didn't.

Puppet: I want to be like the ones who earned more!

Teacher: For sure! What God is saying is that while we're waiting for Jesus to come back, his children should use their time and talents wisely and work hard for him. We bring him glory when we love him and obey him.

Puppet: What are some ways we can do that?

★ Another way to do this is to have Teacher 1 do all the talking parts and Teacher 2 do all the movements of the action figures and counting of the coins.

Puppet: When I think of what a wonder Jesus is, I want everyone to know that he's amazing!

Teacher: Awesome!
Puppet: Powerful!
Teacher: Loving!
Puppet: Kind!

Teacher: He's the Creator!

Puppet: Immanuel!
Teacher: Carpenter!
Puppet: Almighty!
Teacher: Savior!
Puppet: King of kings!

Teacher: Let's get out there and share the good news that Jesus offers eternal life to all who believe in him. Let's remember our mission and use our days wisely for him.

Puppet: I will! Know, grow, and go. That's our mission! I won't forget. Well, speaking of going, I'm actually going to go right now to tell my friend Charley about Jesus, but thanks for sharing so many special memories with me this week at Wonder Junction! It's been a great week!

Teacher: It has been a great week. Let's say "bye" to Sam, everyone. Do so.

Part 3: Animal Pal Review (5 minutes)

Share the DAY 5 ANIMAL PAL POSTER to summarize today's teaching. Pass out the Wonder Junction Maps and Mission stickers, and have kids add today's animal pal. They can take these home today. You may want to show them the bookmarks that are available if you plan to give these out.

What kind of animal is our animal pal today? A horse. And what's our horse's name? Mission. Mission is on a mission. He's got a job to do, just like the Old West circuit riders who came to town to share the good news of Jesus. LEADING A CHILD TO CHRIST

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes." Romans 1:16

VBS presents an ideal opportunity to share the life-changing gospel of Jesus Christ with all attending. Every leader and team member should be ready to clearly present the gospel and counsel those wanting to learn more. Children are usually softhearted toward things of the Lord, and some will be interested in becoming a follower of Christ. Be ready, because eternal matters matter most!

Before

- Pray. Salvation is God's work, not ours. We cannot bring about salvation for anyone. We need to ask God to prepare the children and open their hearts to him.
- **Be prepared.** Learn more about presenting the gospel and counseling a child about salvation.

During

The gospel will be presented during the lesson time. Opportunities may arise, however, to share with a child one-on-one or with a small group of children. If so, keep the following in mind:

- Becoming a child of God involves repenting of one's sin and having faith in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Repentance involves understanding what sin is (disobeying God's commands) and desiring to turn from that sin.
- You can use the booklet How Can I Become a Child of God? along with your Bible to explain the plan of salvation. Children need to see and hear God's Word, so have your Bible opened and marked ahead of time with the appropriate Scriptures.
- Avoid abstract phrases like "asking Jesus into your heart."
 Instead, use terminology like "becoming a child of God."
 Most children still think in concrete terms and need examples that are easy to understand.
- If a child indicates an interest to know more after hearing the gospel presentation, ask questions (such as the following) that require more than a "yes" or "no" answer:
 - » What do you want to talk to me about?
 - » Do you know what sin is?
 - » Can you think of a specific sin (wrong) you have done?
 - » Are you bothered by your sin?

These questions are important. A child who cannot verbalize a sin or does not seem to be repentant about being a sinner may not fully understand his need for a Savior. In this situation, you might list some child-oriented examples of sin and ask him to notice any time he catches himself sinning over the next few days. Give him the *How Can I Become a Child of God?* booklet. Pray with him, then send him on his way. Check back a day or two later, if possible.

- If the child does seem to be sincerely sorry for his sins, you can proceed with more questions like the following:
 - » Why did Jesus come to earth? Why did Jesus need to die? Why did Jesus rise again?

- » Why do you want Jesus to be your Savior?
- » Why should God let you into his family? (Make sure the child understands that salvation is not based on what he does but is a gracious gift of God through faith in the death and resurrection of Jesus.)
- Pray for discernment while listening to a child's answers.
- When a child seems to have a basic understanding of salvation (belief in Jesus' death and resurrection, admission of and repentance from sin, and a desire to follow the Lord), encourage him to talk to his parents about what it means to become a child of God (if they are followers of Christ). Encourage a child who comes from a non-Christian home to verbalize his understanding to the Lord through prayer. There is no one prayer that should be prayed. Encourage him to ask the Lord to forgive him and help him know he is a child of God.
- Let him see in your words and your face that you are excited that he wants to become a child of God! Read Luke 15:10 to him.
- Some children may not want to make decisions but may want to learn more, to be assured of salvation, or to confess sin. Read Romans 10:9–10 and John 10:28–29 with children who are seeking assurance of their salvation. Encourage them to ask the Lord to help them know they are his children. If a child wants to confess sin, read 1 John 1:9 with him and encourage him to ask the Lord to help him know he is forgiven when he repents.

After

- Review what it means to be a child of God.
 - » How long does God keep his children? (Hebrews 13:5; John 10:28–29)
 - » Can anything separate God from his children? (Romans 8:38–39)
 - » What happens when God's children sin? (1 John 1:9)
 - » What do children of God believe? (Romans 10:9)
- Explain that Jesus loves his children and wants to spend time with them. Discuss practical ways to grow as a child of God. Provide him with the *Growing Up in God's Family* booklet and share the following:
 - » Read your Bible and obey what you read. You can start your Bible reading with the short Bible study book you will receive the last day of VBS. (Provide a Bible if he doesn't have one. Be sure to fill out the presentation page.)
 - » Pray every day. Prayer is talking to God.
 - » Go to a church that believes and teaches the Bible as the Word of God.
 - » Tell others about Jesus. Tell your friends, family, and neighbors how they can become children of God.
- Fill out a Decision Card and turn it in to the VBS director.
- Stay in touch with the child through postcards, visits, or phone calls. Invite him to upcoming church events.
